



My Dear Dr. Schliemann.

I have not

forgotten your request and my promise to send you a photograph of Mrs. Field and myself in return for the one of yourself and Mrs. Schliemann which you were kind enough to give us when we were at Athens. My delay has been, to a great extent, caused by the fact that until quite recently we have had no photograph of Mrs. Field which at all pleased us. The one I now send is not entirely satisfactory -

to me at least - but is
one obtained.

Mrs. Field and myself
often recall the pleasant hours we
passed at your house at Athens.
It is a bright spot in our recol-
lection of our Eastern trip. As
your fame is world-wide we
have many inquiries of you.
After we have described to our
friends the wonderful remains of
antiquity at the ancient city,
the first question is, almost in-
variably, whether we have met
you there. Our regret is that
we had not the pleasure of
meeting you before the day of our
departure, and thus of seeing more
of you and Mrs. Schleimann,
and hearing from you lips the

researches.

Within the last few days
I have been reading your auto-
biography - prefixed to your
"Sils". And it has greatly in-
terested me and added to
my regret that I had not
met you years ago. Perhaps

forward so successfully in your

Dr. Schliemann lives in [princely style] at Athens, in an imposing marble palace which bears on its front, above the door, the inscription in letters of gold: "Hall of Illium." Here, every other Thursday evening during the winter, he entertains a hundred or more professors, journalists and statesmen. The spacious parlors afford room for more than three hundred guests. All the decorations of the house commemorate Dr. Schliemann's great researches. The floors are paved with Italian mosaics, the walls covered with Pompeian frescoes and patterns of objects found at Troy and Mycenæ, and Homeric mottoes and inscriptions abound. At the family table classic Greek alone is spoken, and even the servants have classic names; the gardener is Priam, the porter Bellerophon, and the two nurses Hecuba and Polyxena.








Votre dernière lettre, dont nous avons apprécié toute l'importance, est en ce moment entre les mains de M.M. 

City of Indianapolis, Ind.


