**THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AMERICAN SCHOOL OF CLASSICAL STUDIES AT ATHENS
1912-13**

To the Trustees of the American School of Classical Studies at Athens and to the Council of the Archaeological Institute of America:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to report on the affairs of the School for the year ending August 31, 1913.

Some changes in the governing boards of the School have taken place during the past year: Professor Herbert Weir Smyth of Harvard has succeeded Professor William W. Goodwin on the Board of Trustees. Professor Francis G. Allinson of Brown University, Professor Campbell Bonner of the University of Michigan, and Professor Charles Forster Smith of the University of Wisconsin have been elected to the Managing Committee. The University of Wisconsin now, for the first time, joins in the support of the School. The untimely death, on February 23, 1913, of the President of the Archaeological Institute, Professor H. L. Wilson, prevented his active service on the Managing Committee. His place has been taken by Professor F. W. Shipley of Washington University, St. Louis.

The progress on the addition to the building at Athens has been satisfactory. Excavation for the foundations was begun on April 8, and on April 26 the first stone was laid by Professor Martin L. D'Ooge, who was Director when the corner stone of the present building was laid. The foundations are now ready for the superstructure, and the material for this is being gathered as fast as possible. In preparation for the work the books have been removed from the Library and placed in different parts of the house, care being taken that the change shall interfere with their convenient use as little as possible.

The School was opened as usual on October 1st by Professor Bill, who took charge in the absence of the Director. The

latter returned to Athens in January, and since then has been able, with increasing good health, to attend to his more important duties. At the beginning of the year, and for a time afterward, Mr. Sanborn, formerly Secretary, was in Athens, and beside conducting the usual journey to the Peloponnesus, he was of the greatest assistance in the general management of the School. Professor J. M. Paton has had charge of the Library during most of the year, and after the departure of Mr. Sanborn, Mr. Blegen, Fellow of the School, undertook the duties of the Secretary.

There have been eight students in residence, seven regular members and one associate member. Five were for the first time in Greece. The students had previously studied in eleven different institutions in this country. The work has in general followed the usual lines. The students have travelled considerably in the country, have been at work on assigned or chosen topics of study, and have attended lectures and exercises given by the Director, Professor Bill and Mr. Dinsmoor. Lectures in other Schools also have as usual been thrown open to our students.

Several noteworthy articles have appeared during the year in the *Journal of Archaeology*, as the result of work at the School. These are the Director's important study of the Older Parthenon, Dr. A. C. Johnson's publication of the inscriptions he discovered on the Acropolis, and Mr. Dinsmoor's remarkable articles on Attic building accounts. Mr. Dinsmoor has also brought out in the *Bulletin de correspondance hellénique* his important studies of the Delphian Treasuries. Professor Paton has made good progress in his editorial work on the publication of the Erechtheum, and has brought the time when the book may be issued distinctly nearer.

The distressing war which has been going on in the Balkans has made all excavations impossible, but Miss Walker and Miss Goldman have spent much time in work upon their finds of previous years at Halae. Miss Walker discussed these at an open meeting of the School on April 18, and Miss Goldman has lectured upon them in this country. At this same meeting, Mr. Dinsmoor presented his study of the building inscriptions of the Erechtheum.

Mr. Blegen, Fellow of the School, has continued his work on the history of Corinth, and Mr. Buenger, Fellow of the Institute,

beside some general work, has made a study of the Bastion of Athena Nike. The Committee on Fellowships report for next year the appointment of Mr. E. H. Swift as Fellow of the Institute. The stipend of the Fellowship of the School will this year be used for a Fellowship in Architecture, and the Fellow, Mr. W. Stuart Thompson of New York, will have oversight of the work on the addition to the School building. This step has been taken to enable Mr. Dinsmoor, the Architect of the School, to give his time without undue interruption to his work on the Propylaea, and to relieve the Director of detailed supervision. When the addition is completed, the Managing Committee feel that the rental of rooms occupied by students should be somewhat raised. The income from this source does not now meet the expense of maintaining these rooms, and the rentals are so much lower than those commonly charged for similar accommodation elsewhere in Athens that students who room outside the School are subjected to unfair discrimination.

Certain gifts to the Library are acknowledged in the list of contributors to the School. I would here make mention of a gift of \$100 to the Greek Red Cross, in the name of the School, by Mrs. E. G. Radeke of Providence, R. I., whose generosity in past years has placed us under much obligation to her. We are indebted also to Mr. Nathan Straus of New York for the very useful and practical gift of seven Pasteurizers.

The Managing Committee is under lasting obligation to Professor and Mrs. Bill for their untiring and efficient help in carrying on the School. Professor Bill acted as Director until Mr. Hill arrived in January, and after that date he continued to represent the School in public, and to relieve the Director in many ways. In large measure owing to this relief, Mr. Hill is enabled to take up his work again as usual.

A good many American scholars have visited Athens during the year, some of whom have been connected with the School in past years. Among them were Professor Martin L. D'Ooge, formerly Director, Professor G. E. Howes, formerly Annual Professor, Mr. L. D. Caskey, formerly Secretary, Professor Manatt of Brown, Professor E. K. Rand of Harvard, Annual Professor at the School in Rome, Professor E. Y. Robbins of Princeton, Professor G. M. Whicher of the New York Normal College, Professor Thomas K. Sidey of the University of Washington, Professor

I. M. Linforth of California, Professor K. F. Weston of Williams, and Professor Marian Whitney of Vassar.

The School has been fortunate in the presence in Athens during the year of President J. G. Schurman, as Minister of the United States to Greece. We are indebted to him and Mrs. Schurman for much hospitable courtesy.

During the coming year Professor W. S. Ferguson of Harvard will serve as the Annual Professor. Mr. Dinsmoor will continue as Architect of the School and Mr. Blegen has been appointed to the Secretaryship for two years.

AMERICAN SCHOOL AT ATHENS

1911

The American School of Classical Studies at Athens was founded by the Archaeological Institute of America in 1881, and is supported by the coöperation of leading American Universities and Colleges. It is in charge of a Managing Committee, and its property is vested in an incorporated Board of Trustees.

REGULATIONS OF THE SCHOOL

THE OBJECT OF THE SCHOOL

I. The object of the School shall be to furnish to graduates of American Universities and Colleges and to other qualified students an opportunity to study Classical Literature, Art, and Antiquities in Athens, under suitable guidance; to prosecute and to aid original research in these subjects; and to coöperate with the Archaeological Institute of America, so far as it may be able, in conducting the exploration and excavation of classic sites.

THE MANAGING COMMITTEE

II. The Managing Committee shall disburse the annual income of the School, and shall have power to make such regulations for its government as it may deem proper. Each of the Universities and Colleges uniting in support of the School shall have representation on the Committee. The President of the Archaeological Institute, the Director of the School, the Chairman of the Managing Committee of the American School for Oriental Study and Research in Palestine, and the Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of the Institute, shall be *ex officio* members of the Committee. The Professors of the School shall also be members of the Committee during their year of office and the year following. The Committee shall have power to add to its membership.

III. The Managing Committee shall meet annually, in New York, on the second Saturday in May. By special vote these meetings may be held elsewhere. Special meetings may be called

at any time by the Chairman. At any meeting, nine members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum for business.

IV. The officers of the Managing Committee shall be a Chairman, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. There shall be also an Executive Committee.

V. The Chairman of the Managing Committee shall be the official representative in America of the interests of the School. He shall present a report annually to the Archaeological Institute concerning the affairs of the School.

VI. The Executive Committee shall consist of eight members. The Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, the President of the Archaeological Institute of America, shall be *ex officio* members of the Executive Committee; the other four members shall be chosen by the Managing Committee in the following manner: at the annual meeting in May, 1901, two members of the Managing Committee shall be chosen to serve for two years and two members to serve for one year, and at each subsequent annual meeting two members shall be chosen to serve for two years. The Chairman and Secretary of the Managing Committee shall be the Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee.

VII. The Managing Committee shall elect from its members as its representative an Associate Editor of the Journal of the Institute.

THE DIRECTOR AND THE PROFESSORS

VIII. The work of the School in Greece shall be under the superintendence of a Director. He shall be chosen and his salary and the term for which he is chosen shall be fixed by the Managing Committee. He shall have charge of the School building, and shall be resident in Athens from the 1st of October to the 1st of July, with liberty to absent himself for short periods for purposes of exploration or research. He shall superintend the work of each member of the School, advising him in what direction to turn his studies, and assisting him in their prosecution. He shall have control of all excavations undertaken by the School. He shall make semi-annual Reports to the Managing Committee, in November and in May, of the work accomplished by the School.

IX. Each year the Managing Committee shall appoint from the instructors of the Universities and Colleges uniting in support

of the School one or more Professors, who shall reside in Athens during the ensuing year and take part in the instruction of the School. The Committee may appoint other Professors and Instructors, as circumstances require. In case of the illness or absence of the Director, the senior Professor shall act as Director for the time being.

X. The Director and Professors shall give such instruction as they may deem desirable and shall have oversight of the work upon which students are engaged. They shall at times hold public meetings at which such students of the School as they may select, or other persons invited by them to take part, shall read papers on subjects of their study and research, or make reports on the work undertaken by them or by the School.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

XI. The School year shall extend from the first day of October to the first day of July. During this period a regular member of the School shall ordinarily reside in Athens; but permission may be granted him by the Director to travel and study for a limited time elsewhere in Greece, in Greek lands, or in Italy. Further, under exceptional circumstances, with the consent of the Director and of the Chairman of the Managing Committee, a regular member of the School may be permitted to prosecute special studies in countries other than those just named, provided such studies are supplementary to work already begun in Athens.

THE MEMBERS OF THE SCHOOL

XII. Regular members of the School shall be those who are enrolled for a full year's work. Associate members may be admitted to the School for a shorter term, but not for a period of less than three months; they shall be subject to the same general regulations and shall be admitted to the same privileges as regular members.

XIII. Bachelors of Arts of coöperating Universities and Colleges, and all Bachelors of Arts who have studied at any of these institutions as candidates for a higher degree, shall be admitted to membership in the School on presenting to the Chairman of the Managing Committee a satisfactory certificate from the University or College at which they have last studied, stating that they are competent to pursue courses of study

at the School. Such members shall be subject to no charge for tuition. All other persons who desire to become members of the School shall make application to the Chairman of the Managing Committee, and if admitted they shall be required to pay a fee of \$25 per annum for tuition and library privileges. Students occupying rooms in the School building shall pay a fee of \$20 per annum for the use of furniture.*

XIV. Every regular member of the School shall pursue some definite subject of study or research in Classical Literature, Art, or Antiquities, and shall present a paper embodying the results of some important part of his year's work, unless for special reasons he is excused from these obligations by the Director. His paper, if approved by the Director, shall be sent to the Committee on Publication, in accordance with the provisions of Regulation XXI. If approved by the Editorial Board of the Journal also, it shall be issued as a publication of the School.

XV. Excavation shall not be part of the regular work of a member of the School, but any member may, at the discretion of the Director, be permitted to take part in it. All work of excavation, of investigation, or of any other kind done by any member during his connection with the School, shall be regarded as done for the School and by the School, and shall be under the supervision and control of the Director.

XVI. No communication, even of an informal nature, shall be made by any member of the School to the public press, which has not previously been submitted to the Director and authorized by him.

XVII. Americans resident or travelling in Greece, may, at the discretion of the Director, be allowed to enjoy the privileges of the School, although not enrolled as students.

FELLOWSHIPS

XVIII. The Fellowships administered by the Managing Committee shall be awarded mainly by competitive examination. The subjects on which candidates shall be examined, and the places and times at which examinations will be held, shall be announced not less than six months in advance.

XIX. Every holder of one of these Fellowships shall be enrolled as a regular member of the School, and shall be required to fulfil

the maximum requirement of residence, to present a paper embodying the results of some important part of his year's work.

PUBLICATIONS

XX. All manuscripts, drawings, or photographs intended for publication shall be sent, after approval by the Director, to the Committee on Publication.

XXI. Every article sent for publication shall be written on comparatively light paper of uniform size, with a margin of at least two inches on the left of each page. The writing shall be on only one side of the leaf, and shall be clear and distinct, particularly in the quotations and references. Especial care shall be taken in writing Greek, that the printer may not confound similar letters, and the accents shall be placed strictly above the proper vowels, as in printing. All quotations and references shall be carefully verified *by the author*, after the article is completed, by comparison with the original sources. Failure to comply with the provisions of this regulation shall be sufficient ground for the rejection of the article.

FELLOWSHIPS

1914-1915

IN THE SCHOOL AT ATHENS

Two Fellowships in Greek Archaeology, with a stipend of \$800 each, will be awarded for the year 1914-1915, at the American School of Classical Studies at Athens.

The Fellowships in Archaeology are awarded chiefly on the basis of competitive written examinations, but other evidence of the ability and attainments of candidates will be considered. They are awarded for one year; a Fellow in Classical Archaeology, however, may, at the discretion of the Committee on Fellowships, be reappointed for a second term without an examination, on the recommendation of the Director and Professors of the School, but not more than one such reappointment will be made in any year, and no Fellowship in Classical Archaeology may be held for more than two years.

The holders of these Fellowships will be enrolled as regular members of the School, and will be required to pursue their studies, under the supervision of its Director, during the full school year. But Fellows may, with the consent of the Director, spend a limited portion of the year in residence at the School in Rome, under the supervision of its Director. In addition to his general studies, each holder of a Fellowship is required to prosecute some definite subject of special research, and, after the completion of the year, to present a paper embodying the results of his investigation. Twice in the year, namely on February 1 and July 1, each Fellow will make a report to the Chairman of the Committee on Fellowships, with regard to the use which he has made of his time. A somewhat detailed description of the progress of his researches will be required. For the prosecution of his special investigation he may obtain leave, under certain conditions, to supplement his studies at Athens by researches elsewhere than in Greece. (See Regulations XI and XIX.)

Each candidate must announce in writing his intention to

offer himself for examination. This announcement must be made to the Chairman of the Committee on Fellowships (Professor H. N. Fowler, *Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio*), and must be in the Chairman's hands not later than February 1, 1914. The receipt of the application will be acknowledged and the candidate will receive a blank, to be filled out and returned to the Chairman by February 15, in which he will give information in regard to his studies and attainments. A copy of this blank may also be obtained at any time by application to the proper Chairman.

The examinations will be held in Athens, and at any of the universities or colleges represented on the Managing Committee of the School, on March 12-14, 1914.

The award of the Fellowships will be made, and notice sent to all candidates, as soon as practicable after the examinations are held. This notice will be mailed probably not later than May 1. The income of these Fellowships is paid in four equal instalments on September 15, December 15, March 15, and June 1.

The Fellowship examinations of 1915 will be held in March of that year under conditions similar to those which are stated above. Special inquiries on the subject of the Fellowships of the School at Athens should be addressed to Professor Harold N. Fowler, *Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio*.

INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS

Students who desire to apply for admission to the School at Athens should address, if in America, the Chairman of the Managing Committee; if in Europe, the Director of the School. Information with reference to the School may be obtained from either of these officers. The application should be accompanied by a statement of the preparation of the applicant.

The student should gain as great command as possible of the German, French, and Modern Greek languages before going abroad; and the summer preceding a year at the School may profitably be spent in France or Germany, working in the Museums (Paris, Berlin, Dresden, Munich) and obtaining practice in French or German conversation.

The usual port of arrival in Greece for those coming from Western Europe is Patras, eight hours by rail from Athens. To Patras the shortest sea route is from Brindisi (thirty hours, including the stop at Corfu), with four steamers weekly. Those

who come from countries north of Italy will avoid the long railway journey to Brindisi by taking the weekly express steamer from Trieste. The Italian steamer from Venice is less direct.

From Marseilles there are fortnightly steamers to the Piraeus, via Naples; and from Genoa, via Naples and Catania; also weekly steamers from Catania to the Piraeus, touching at Canea in Crete.

If the student wishes to go directly from America to Italy, he will take one of the lines which have a regular express service from New York or Boston to Genoa or Naples (minimum price about \$80 for first-cabin passage). Brindisi is twelve hours by rail from Naples.

For the voyage from America to Greece, direct, one may take a steamer of the Austro-American Line at New York for Patras (prices the same as to Naples).

The cost of living in Athens is very much what one chooses to make it; but the city is no longer among the less expensive European capitals. At the large hotels in Athens, board and lodging can be obtained for \$14 per week; at small hotels and in private families, for \$8 per week, and upward. A limited number of men students may have rooms, without board, in the School building at Athens.

The School library at Athens, which now contains about five thousand volumes, provides all the books that are most essential for study in Greece, and the student in travelling should encumber himself with few books.
