TUESDAY, MAY 7, 2024 2:00 PM TOUR AND "A BELIEF IN BOOKS" EXHIBIT ON THE 270TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE NEW YORK SOCIETY LIBRARY New York Society Library, 53 East 79th Street, New York, NY

Established in 1754, the New York Society Library is the city's oldest cultural institution and one of the first libraries in the United States. The Library founders, all Enlightenment men committed to personal freedom, religious tolerance, and the separation of church and state, believed that a subscription library, open to all, would inevitably lead to a better society.

The exhibit, A Belief in Books, addresses the uncomfortable fact that while Enlightenment thought demanded individual rights for white men, it also upheld the idea that slavery was part of the natural world order. Every aspect of New York's economy relied on the slave trade, as did the fortune of every colonist, including the Library's founders. Only British ships with British goods could enter New York harbor, and the ships that carried books from London also brought enslaved Africans to the American and Caribbean colonies. Books on display from the Library's collection between 1754 and the outbreak of the Revolutionary War illustrate the wide variety of genres and titles read by Library members.

Also included in the tour will be the viewing of a notable manuscript by Lord Byron.

Join a private lunch and captivating conversation highlighting the American School of Classical Studies at Athens's most recent exhibit entitled, "In the Name of Humanity: American Relief Aid in Greece 1918–1929." Co-curators Natalia Vogeikoff-Brogan, Doreen Canaday Spitzer Director of Archives, and Maria Georgopoulou, Director of the Gennadius Library, will discuss the fascinating background to this exhibit, which tells and illustrates the story of one of the greatest humanitarian efforts in human history.

The profound impact of the Lausanne Convention's population exchange reverberated for a decade as 1.2 million Greek Orthodox Turkish nationals were uprooted from Turkey to Greece, while 400,000 Muslim Greek nationals were moved from Greece to Turkey. American humanitarian agencies such as the American Red Cross, Near East Relief, American Women's Hospitals, and the YMCA united to deliver invaluable emergency relief to orphaned children and displaced refugees.

"The Wisdom of Stories" is the third of Emily Wilson's 2023–2024 Thalia Potamianos lectures on the theme *The Myth, Magic, and Mystery of the Ancient Greeks: Exploring the Connections to Contemporary Culture.* The Thalia Potamianos Lecture Series is hosted annually by the Gennadius Library of the American School of Classical Studies at Athens thanks to the generous support of Phokion Potamianos. The first lecture on "The Vulnerability of Heroism" occurred last October in Athens, Greece. The second installment, "Destiny, Tradition, and Choice," took place in Washington, D.C. Wilson's third and final lecture, "The Wisdom of Stories," will be at St. Bartholomew's Church in New York City. It will be live-streamed and simulcast in Greek.

Classicist, author, translator, and Professor of Classical Studies at the University of Pennsylvania, Emily Wilson has recently earned widespread recognition and praise for her acclaimed translations of Homer's *Odyssey* (November 2017) and *Iliad* (September 2023).

Professors Jenifer Neils, former Director of the American School, and Alan Shapiro, former Dietrich von Bothmer Research Scholar at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, will provide an engaging one-hour tour in the museum's Greek art galleries. With their expert guidance you will explore the imagery of women in ancient Greece, from abstract Cycladic figurines to hyper-realistic Hellenistic statues.

Our guests will also have the opportunity to examine painted vases from the Geometric period to the 5th century BCE, and to consider the various roles played by women (wives, mourners, priestesses, servants), their different social and economic circumstances, and their important contributions to Greek history.
