Deposit investigated by us for D. Jordan, because of a curse tablet in it, in June 1972. Of the Knidian eponyms, listed here in alphabetical order, ΣΩΣΙ-ΜΑΧΟΣ is 1/2 of 2nd, ΑΜΟΤΕΛΗΣ ca. mid 2nd, ΑΓΑΘΟΚΛΗΣ and ΙΕΡΟΚΛΗΣ before ca. 108 BC, while the rest - 10 handles naming 9 different eponyms=are datable ca. 108 - ca. 78 apparently. For the two post-Sullann eponyms ΘΕΥΠΟΜΠΟΣ and ΔΑΜΟΚΡΙΤΟΣ, see Delos 27 under E 196.

Note there are no Late Knidian, and no Latin.

D. Jordan inquires what date is given to this group by the SAT. ^(*) C. Kochler looks up their ^{ss} card, and then the epigrapher is the dated list, etc. (and discussions in Demos 27).

We see that there are 2 kinds datable by ca 146 B.C. The rest are scattered from late V (^{epigraphy} - Jordan) through VI A, B, and C, i.e., there are 2 epis who are durri first & last - Sultan, (Apollonios, Demetrios).

On the other hand, there are no LK.

So the stamps suggest a latest date ca. 78 B.C. (and 1 durri). There are no Lates, and all the kinds only a single (?) unknown origin (ss 5000, Mapou), for which we have no context date.

This deposit is the best context we have for Pamphylian, but handles of this class found at Nessana (Auja el Hafir, in the Negeb) came from a filling datable ca. mid 2nd to mid 1st B.C. The Roman (rim) fragment is assigned by ELW to her Type 5, which she dates "late 2nd - early 1st B.C." The Thasian and Unclassified handles are leftovers, of 4th and possibly late 5th c. B.C.

To S. Rotroff I said (19.III.74), "See Delos 27", i.e. look up the deposit in the index (p.381) and the page references there cited. I also said to S.R., "to early second quarter" of 1st B.C. This was a somewhat loose remark such as one makes to give oneself room. There are in the deposit two Knidian stamps (SS 3196 and 3199) which belong apparently to the period when duoviri were named in them, but after a break in production which seems to be datable 88-85 B.C. We can account for about 7 terms in this period, so we guess that they were all within the period 85-78 B.C. On all this, see Delos 27, p. 322. Further reference to the deposit M 23 : 1, see B.C.H. Suppl. I, p. 194, with note 15, and the Pamphylian neck in it is catalogued *ibid.*, p.205, under 12.

I think I would now describe the material that I know in this deposit as ~~indeed~~ datable post-Sullan, perhaps still in the first quarter of the 1st 1st century B.C.

In Grace 1934, p. 294, under no. 285,

this deposit, called by its original name "A - well at 14/1st, is date 2nd B.C., thus giving a surprising date to the Roman stamped amphoras P 499 (285) and P 498 (fig. 1 on p. 295). In Agora ^{p. 391} XII, the top part of the deposit is still called late 2nd.

However, in Agora ^{"Upper"} XII, see p. 101, the top part of G 14:2 is brought to st. after 85 B.C., on the basis of the ^{VG} dating of the jar SS 9464, stamps KT 1788 + KT 2128, esp. [E³] $\beta\alpha\omega\lambda\alpha\varsigma$. This period is listed as VTC in Grace 1935, p. 35. On this period, see, still best, EAD 27, p. 322.

Partial publications of this well and its contents:

1) Hesperia 1934, p.208 (under the original name of the deposit, Δ, Well at 14/IΣΤ), description, with mention of amphoras that blocked the shaft at depth 3 meters; and pp.294-295, the shape of these (Italian) amphoras is illustrated, and a stamp on one of them is published. The amphoras, together with an accumulation on top of them, are called the Upper Fill of the well. Below them, the shaft ^{many} was empty for ~~xxxx~~ meters, after which followed the Middle Fill, 2nd to 4th centuries B.C.

2) Agora IV, lamps

3) Agora XII, classical black glaze

4) Agora XXII, Hellenistic mold-made bowls

In 1932 when the well was excavated, the pottery as a whole in the Upper Filling of the well appeared to date still in the 2nd century B.C., and thus ~~proximated~~ provided an interesting context for the Italian amphoras.

In Agora XXII under G 14 : 2, Rotroff used the results of recent studies of late Knidian stamped amphoras, which identify some stamp types as apparently a little after 85 B.C. She cites a restored amphora in the Upper Fill of G 14 : 2 (SS 9464, not yet put together in 1934, dated in the term of [ΕΥ]ΒΟΥΛΟΣ) as belonging to this period. On Knidian stamped amphoras of this late period, cf. Délos 27, pp.333-334, under E 96. The eponyms of this period are listed in Hesperia 1985, p.35, under Period VI, those marked (C).

The date of the Upper Fill of G 14 : 2 is now moved from before 100 B.C. to latish in the first quarter of the first century B.C.



G 14 : 2. The eponym of SS 326 is ΑΝΑΡΟΜΕΝΗΣ, believed to date shortly before 88 B.C. The eponym of SS 9464 is probably to be restored [ΕΥ]ΒΟΥΛΟΣ, and to be dated 88 - ca. 85 B.C. soon after the break in Knidian stamping of Κνιδίας Βούλευτος. The eponym of SS 9465 is also ΑΛΕΞΑΝΔΡΟΣ, of the duoviri period (named by ΔΑΙΟΚΡΑΤΗΣ, hence of the first half of the period, see above under C 10 : 1).

So those pig jugs are not identified in Agora vols. up to now. There could have been ^{reference to} mention of Green 1934 publication of them, pp. 294-295 with photos of the stamp ATTAA and the shape of the jugs, but also on p. 205, a full account of the wall as deposit (here called A, Wall at 14/15^E, but later G 14; 2 by the city grid); the position of the jugs is made clear. The date of the top fill is given as "2nd cent." as no doubt I had been told it was quite it remained so in Agora ~~XII~~; but in Agora ~~XXII~~ has been revised.

All this was instigated by the need to inform M. Hahn, who found a type of a pig-jar (hit on P 498 etc.) in Chania, Crete.

Summary and lists notebook pp. 3147-3153 (vol.XVI). P.3149: "The fill of the 46/IA shaft, with the exception of a little Roman at the top, was the same as the bottom fill of 44/IΓ - late Hellenistic, running down to the end of the 1st cent. B.C. and perhaps into the 1st century of our era. . . . The great bulk . . late Hell. with XVII and XIX lamps and without any early Roman lamps . . masses of broken tiles and plaster, similar to . . 44/IΓ bottom fill . . probably from the destruction (Sullan) of the first period of the Roman villa."

Knidian stamps are late duoviri period, the eponyms ΑΝΔΡΟΜΕΝΗΣ and ΕΡΜΩΝ, and post-duoviri (ANTIPATROS and the Late Knidian SS 5024); plus a lone item SS 5034 which

joins with SS 5318 from the bottom fill of D 11 : 4, and dates, like nearly all the stamps in that bottom fill, in the first half of the 2nd century B.C. Nearly all the Knidian stamps in ~~EXIESX~~ D 12 : 2, then, date in the ^{perhaps 1/4} first half of the 1st century B.C. _{the}

Chian and Koan would be dated by association with Knidian. The Rhodian, SS 5025, may be end of 2nd B.C. Incidentally it is a close match with SS 5126 from the upper filling of D 11 : 4 (not analyzed), and may very likely come from the same amphora.

D 12 : 2 has been cited recently by DBT: Hesperia 1965, p. 50; and Hesperia 1966, p.10. It is not listed in Agora V or VII; see Agora IV, p.236, where it is described as having a filling of the late 2nd to early 1st century B.C., the same as the bottom filling of D 11 : 4. (Agora X, p.66, has a short version of this description.)

Dear Mr. Benachi,

I thought you might like a copy of this rather sketchy analysis of your group. It is a little awkward to make a list like this when there are no numbers of objects to refer to. A group is probably worth numbering.

This one is particularly interesting in that we have no other group including late Knidian combined with contemporary Rhodian, I mean Knidian datable later than the destructions of Delos and Athens 88-86 BC. A good bit more investigation will be needed for the Rhodian in your set, but three of the names certainly, ΑΓΑΩΝΑΡΤΟΣ, ΔΙΟΝΥΣΙΟΣ, and ΘΕΥΓΕΝΗΣ, are known from inscriptions as priests of Halios of the 1st century BC. There are epigraphical possibilities also for ΝΑΥΣΙΚΟΣ and ΤΙΜΩΝΑΣ ~~also~~, of my Eponyms article. The group as you gave it to us does include ~~also~~ some second century and beginning 1st century stuff also, but that happens. If you can keep this lot apart, perhaps we can read a few more of the unread, and get some scale photos.

Dear Miss Grace-

I am anxiously awaiting your return from Tharos in order to get replies about the hundred or so matters I have put to you in past letters - mostly pertaining to your forthcoming visit to Alexandria. I would also like - if and when possible - comments on the photos which I hope you have by now received.

Today I made rubbings of some late Cypriots which turned up in the last batch along with a large amount of late Rhodesians. All the latter will be grouped and I shall send you rubbings of the whole lot - for you to get a statistical idea of what comes out of a nest of late Rhodesians down here. Among potters there is Φειδωνος - Διονυσιος - κατεινος - and during a brief examination I found two of ΑΓΙΩΡΧΙΟΣ the eponym - also two of ΑΤΑΜΑΤΟΣ. Tell his party - also by the shape of handles appear to be contemporary - and closely linked - I should add that there are a lot of circular stamps in the lot - most having only a large rose either well or without traces of letters - the late Cypriots - enclosed - come from the same nest - and in the Coats - those dreadful large seals of 10x9 are the most numerous -

Sheet A - herein enclosed - carries latest Cyprian arrivals (not late handles). The second seal of line 5

is a beautiful ivy leaf seal in fine condition - The rubber marked & has an emblem I don't remember seeing previously - a sort of ice lily affair - You must certainly know it -

Sheet B. late Cudeans Nos 1 & 2.

All these seals even the circular Saraband ones are from & lumpy late handles - Ones I don't recollect having seen before are No 3 line 1 - a leaf running with the beat - No 3 line 3 an untidy large stamp taking the full surface of the handle and No 2 line 5 which I can't make out at all - This also applies on Page II to No 2 line 1.

I hope all these Cudeans will prove interesting to this Saraband and prove a segue for things to come in the Cudean line down here in January.

For the time being - that's about all - but there are countless handles drying - some of which will produce something fancy - we doubt -

Note in the Knidian list that "p.-S." means "post-Sullan," and here indicates types belonging to the series of Pnyx 168, a series which follows the late-second-to-Sulla duoviri types. The "Late Knidian" (on which cf Pnyx 169) seem to be somewhat later, but still 1st B.C..

Of the Latin stamps, ELW does not classify SS 5141, and calls the type of SS 5298 "similar to 8", her Type 8 being dated "late 2nd - early 1st cent. B.C.", corresponding here to the Knidian duoviri handles.

Of the Rhodian, most are of the 3rd century B.C., but those of NIKAPXΟΣ (SS 5142), and of the eponym APATOΦANΗΣ (SS 5009) are probably of the late 2nd century BC (they are not from the same jar), thus again corresponding with the duoviri Knidian.

The Thasian and SS 5342 of Unknown Origin are 4th and probably late 5th centuries B.C.

The Chian SS 5131 is of the 3rd cent. B.C. (cf Pnyx 198); and SS 5101, listed as of Unknown Origin, may also be Chian, of the 1st B.C., then, by its shape.

The Pamphylian(?) is primarily dated by this deposit, though in shape and clay it much resembles certain unstamped jars from deposits of about the time of Augustus (P 3466, 8485, and 21790), and may approach them in date.

The latest SAH, according to present knowledge, suggest then a date of latish 1st B.C. for the deposit. These are in particular in Late Knidian.

With regard to 26707: the deposit from which this comes is a well in Section II A, excavated in 1959, and hence not in Robinson's Roman Pottery or - properly - in Perlzweig, Roman Lamps (Agora vol.s); that is to say, the (L 5368) deposit itself is not listed in either of these works. But a lamp from this deposit, and from about the same (upper) level as your pot, does appear in Judith's volume with some supplementary material: see pl.47, G. On p.201, she dates this lamp late 5th to 6th century. And I do not find any real evidence that this deposit (Q 17 : 7) has been dated ~~byzantine~~ later than 6th century, after all. It has not really been thoroughly studied.

Do look at the parallel from George Bass's Byzantine wreck, Arch. Anzeiger, 1962, p.546, fig. 6b, the wreck being, as you know, dated 7th century by the coins of Heraclius. It is certainly the same class of jar. The proportions are not exactly the same, so it may be of slightly different date. I would have guessed that P 26707 was a little later rather than earlier than George's jar. But so late a date has not been established for the findingplace of P 26707.

Could you perhaps say, 6th or 7th century A.D? and remark that a similar jar was found in George Bass's (P. Throckmorton's) wellknown Byz. wreck. (It has appeared in such journals as the National Geographic magazine (U.S.) as well as in the Anzeiger.)

I have mislaid a note I had showing a quite similar jar (though at very small scale) beside somebody who is milking a goat, as I remember it, in a mosaic, I think in Constantinople. Maybe this is a milk can, but unless you think you know what mosaic it is likely to be, better leave it out.

I have the impression there were quite a few more interesting ^{ancient frags} things than did get nos., but probably they are in the bins. Recently Mabel Lang, working on an era represented in marks on a jar or jar, ^{from this well,} came up with a 6th cent. date, at a level where Judith Perdigweir finds the lamps show 3rd cent., as she told me going home in a bus. M.L. ^{JP} ^{has been} casting about for another era to fit better.
