

Here are the catalogue cards of the amphorae with AP numbers, found in wells on the North Slope of the Akropolis by D. Broneer in the late '30's. Sorry I have kept the cards so long, they got forgotten.

I have added some references to these cards, to publications, and to photos I have taken of some.

C. G. Kochubei's dissertation shows that an additional AP number has been given, AP 3507, to the Corinthian B amphora that was with the others from that excavation, apparently snatched up later, and it came to us without a number, just a finding place. See C.G.K., Corinthian A and B Transport Amphorae, Princeton Dissertation 1978, # 216, p. 172. Mayber you had a record of this? I hope so.

Storage: I put the whole (or more or less) jar in the first rack, facing N, in our amphora storage in the basement, according to Agamemnon's plan. The fragments went into Block I of the shelves in the N. Basement. (Block I is for Pre-Persian.)

There may be other files for these which
are out of place, i.e. not put away. I sum
up here, and combine later if ~~when~~ another file
is found (in this cleanup operation for instance).

Beside the amphoras ill. p. 258 (fig. 61) a
number more were found, e.g. several more "banded
Attic", and at least one "Corcyraean". — But
see there is also a publication ^{by J. Broner} in 1938; see p. 183,
fig. 21, two "banded Attic" jugs (AP 1048 and 1174)

The Corcyraean has no AP number, but a tag that
says "3 June 1938, Well B." [35 = AP 3507]




Fig. 21. Large Amphora from Y-Z (left), and Similar Vase from Main Area

These amphoras are stored with Agora amphoras,
either in the Basement, Block I (pre-Persian group)
if they are frags., or Block I, N (north side) if they
are pretty complete. VG photos apparently only
of AP 1491, consider Samian. W. will make
photographs now of 1938, p. 183, fig. 21 and of 1940
p. 258, fig. 61, 2 copies each, one to file with
this and one to cut for cards. Note they illustrated only 6 jugs.

Translation: "Laphilides thinks that Agasikles, Eurykles, K - - - and - - - - kles are utterly dull-witted."

The first line contains two names in the nominative case, but the second name seems to be misspelled. At the beginning of the second line there were probably two names in the nominative case, followed by the infinitive *δοξεῖν*, and a third name in the dative. The letter following the name *Ααφιλίδει* was written as an *alpha* and later changed to *kappa*, or vice versa. The rest of the letters are perfectly clear, but the meaning is puzzling. The most plausible reading is *ζαβ<β>αρύρος*.

The word *βαρύρος* seems to be otherwise unknown, but parallel formations, such as *βαρύφων*, *βαρύζως*, occur. The preposition *ζατά* joined to the word *βαρύρος* here has an intensive force as in *ζατάδηλος*, *ζαταριής*, *ζατάρατος*, *ζατάνκεος*, etc. The abbreviated form of *ζατά* occurs in similar formations in Doric dialects.¹ The infinitive *δοξεῖν* is peculiar in this sentence. If all the names in the nominative were considered as the subject, the form ought to be *δοξοῖν*. Possibly this is some conversational use of the infinitive which does not occur in literature.

The habit on the part of the ancient Athenians of recording on their household ware whatever feelings they had about their neighbors is well attested by graffiti
