Dear John,

It is good of you to send me an offprint of your article in BSA. I <sup>53-54 (for Old  
Smyrene)</sup> had seen it, and looked forward to reading it, but hunting through the number for a report on the coarse wares (of which you had such interesting pieces and such interesting ideas about them) I did not notice that the Fuar jar is illustrated. This will be very convenient for reference. I shall be very glad to have a height measurement.

On your new finds: (and new concerns)

1) the stamp with head right, from the site of Colonea:

this comes from a type which reads ΑΓΡΙΕΙΑ, with the alphas certainly looking a lot like deltas; I enclose a couple of rubbings of a pretty good example (SS 14262); another example, SS 11390, comes from a deposit which does not seem to run down later than ca. 340 B.C.

This type is published by Bon, Timbres Amphoriques de Thasos (1957), no. 2125, but not there claimed to be Thasian, which it isn't. (Provenance not known.)

2) the eponym Peisistratos: I no longer ~~know~~ am clear why Hiller puts him so close to 150; I should say 2nd quarter of second; apart from the great majority of the stamps (many) belonging at this date, there are one or two types which may name an earlier P. (possibly ca. 300 B.C.) but I cannot control these; I should be much interested in any evidence you may have; it must not be forgotten that we are not absolutely solid that the stamp eponyms were the priests of Halios, though I believe this was so, and priests of some sort they certainly were.

3) circular stamp of ΑΙΟΝΥΣΙΟΣ with grape cluster: don't look for him in Hiller since he is a fabricant, not an eponym; seems to be about mid third B.C., according to 4 eonyms with stamps that match his; only two other examples known to me of just your type, both found in Egypt.

I was digging this summer at the sanctuary of Herithaea in the Rhodian Peaea SW of Marmaris. George Bean's stele from Gülcayye (Fraser - Bean, Rhodian Peaea <sup>sup</sup>~~no.~~ 15) evidently relates to a rearrangement or removal of this sanctuary, & the date of the exonymon Peristilater is v. much to the point. I should be most grateful to know how wide the range of his date is.

The other rubbings are of a stamp from a room we cleared, & the name seems to be Dionysios. I wonder if he can be fixed more accurately than I can do for Hiller. It would be a help, as we got virtually no pottery that could be dated at all in the Hellenistic. A few amphoras were completed by uniting some fragments of them which have been found in the different places. The only 42 of the handles are stamped. Most of stamped handles with attribute and monogram and without attribute are Thasian origin.

Three handles on which are stamped the Ethnikon and eponym, are originally from Rhodes. The few others couldn't be yet identified. Moreover, we found many vessels as kantharos, krater etc. on which are written graffiti in addition to the handles. Most of the finds were brought to light out the Cellar-underground storeroom, hollowed into the bedrock, that we are excavating now, and are 6 meters depth from the surface.

All these stamped handles and graffiti and other amphoras without stamped are ready for the publication as a detail article in 1983. After our publication, if you want you may add to your these Thasian stamped handles.

Again thanks for your proposals. We want to write you the new problems connected with the handles of amphora we will be faced with. We couldn't find some of your articles on this subjects. Therefore, would you like to send some reprints of your articles or photocopies.



Dear Professor Erzen,

From Miss Mellink's reports on Archaeology in Asia Minor (AJA 85, 1981, p. 475), I learn that excavating in 1980 in Ainos-Enez you found many Thasian amphoras (or stamped handles?) in stratified levels.

Has a publication been prepared of these? We have here at the Agora Excavations in Athens a very large archive on Thasian amphora stamps. We would be glad to assist with readings, perhaps even with dates, in exchange for photographs (if possible at actual size) or rubbings of stamps from your excavations, especially those with useful context.

Y. Garlan, M. Debidour and I are preparing a new and much larger edition of the corpus of Thasian stamps by A. and A.-M. Bon (*Etudes Thasiennes IV*, 1958). If you cared to add your material to the repertoire that has been collected from many sites in many countries, it would be a much valued addition.

If in fact you have found a number of whole amphoras, capacity measurements are much needed. Professor M. B. Wallace has been working on amphora capacities in connection with his interest in ancient standards, and would, I am sure, be interested in a group of Thasian jars; you might find his suggestions on methods of taking capacities useful (water measurements for whole jars, both by volume and by weight, and dry measurements for mended jars, taken with polystyrene beads). During his call on us at the Stoa on 6.VII.76, Dr. Chr. Börker gave me a photograph of a double-barrelled handle stamped [E]HMIMH  
NOΦA  
(retr.)

*28 VIII.76

The photograph was reproduced by Chr. B. from a very small print attached to an unpublished, manuscript, catalogue by Thiersch of the Calvert Collection.

This handle is lost; I think the whole collection is lost; it was formerly in (Thymbra, on map in Baedeker Konst. und Kästein, opp. p.307) Thymbra, village, itself now lost as it was a Greek village near Troy. The catalogue text on this item describes it as of "hell-ziegel-roten Thon ungefirnisst" and gives ~~Exakt~~ 0.05 as the length of the stamp. This dimension would indicate that in our photo the handle is actually under actual size, though it looks big enough. Bright brick-red clay suggests it may not have been made in Kos. We do not have the name MHNOΦANTOΣ on double-barrelled handles, apart from this one. It does appear on Chian(?) and on the Nikandros Group. As provenance for the handle was given "Alexandria?" i.e. Al.Troas.

I think Dr. Börker said that the manuscript catalogue is in Berlin.

It is odd, the Calverts do not seem to be mentioned in this (1914) Baedeker, e.g. as people who might befriend a traveller near Troy.

Later, same day. DBT tells me that she has seen a manuscript catalogue by Thiersch of the Calvert Collection, in Istanbul. It was just at the time she was publishing her Troy terracottas, just too late to be used, though she thinks she got in a mention. She was informed (I think by Nezih bey Firukli) that the collection itself had been found, in the basement of Uncle Bacon's house (he had married a Calvert), and should now be set up in the museum of Chanakale. One could write, perhaps to the Museum in Chanak., or to Nezih bey. Evidently there were two copies of the manuscript catalogue; it sounds as if hers (the one in Istanbul) had larger photos. It had been bought in a flea market.


Dear Miss Grace,



Dear Dr. Tuchelt:

The reading of your stamp can be restored from duplicates we have on file as follows: [ΕΙ]ΙΕΡ]ΩΝΟΣ . This eponym ΙΕΡΩΝ appears to date close to 200 B.C. — [ΙΙΑ]ΝΑΜΟΥ (A later ΙΕΡΩΝ dates in the late 2nd B.C., but the contexts of two duplicates of your stamp (Agora SS 8020 and SS 12349) definitely associate it with the earlier ΙΕΡΩΝ.)

Revisions in Rhodian chronology reported in my note A.M. 89, 1974, pp.193-200 have not lowered dates of eponyms as far on in the series as ΙΕΡΩΝ 1st, but this short article sketches the basis of our chronology and refers to more extensive treatment. ΙΕΡΩΝ 1st is the commonest eponym in Maiuri's Villanova (Rhodes) deposit (about 94 handles bear his name, quite a number of them on preserved whole jars).

Please let me see whatever you publish of this information. I should be much interested to know how it fits with your context at Didyma, which I only know as of the Roman period.

Outre les trois types que nous avons fait reproduire, ceux qui paraissent le plus souvent sont les suivants (1): le cratère, l'oxybaphon et le canthare de petites dimensions, la pyxis (sous forme de petit pot cylindrique avec couvercle), l'alabastron et ses variétés, l'aryballe, l'œnochoé, la phiale, le chérénips et différentes sortes de plats. On n'a découvert ni rhyton, ni lécythe proprement dit; mais les lécythes aryballiques sont assez nombreux. De petits alabastres et plusieurs poteries communes, du type de la figure 3, offrent cette particularité que l'intérieur n'est pas évidé; ce sont des simulacres de vases à destination spécialement funéraire, comme d'autres objets sans utilité pratique que nous avons signalés (2).

Beaucoup de poteries en forme de coupes sans anses et quelques petites hydries présentent une couverte noire très brillante; lorsque la panse du vase est noire, le col est quelquefois peint en rouge. Il faut encore citer quelques stamnoi en grès et des pots cylindriques d'une couleur grise, sans couverte.

Les lampes en terre-cuite sont relativement rares à Myrina. Elles sont rouges ou noires; plusieurs sont ornées de reliefs floraux, d'ailleurs sans intérêt. L'une d'elles présente cinq ouvertures, la plus grande au milieu, en forme de tuyau, les autres sur les côtés. Ces lampes ne sont pas simplement des symboles funéraires, car l'action du feu y a laissé des traces.

La série des anses d'amphores portant des timbres est fort intéressante à cause des relations commerciales qu'elles attestent entre Myrina, Cnide, Thasos, Rhodes. Ces anses ont été trouvées tant dans les sépultures qu'en dehors: aucune ne fait partie d'un vase conservé entièrement. Nous donnons pour chacune d'elles l'indication de la couleur de la terre (3).



VIII. Amphores pointues sans décor de la Grèce orientale.

Nous avons un certain nombre d'amphores à vin pointues, petites et grandes, provenant des fabriques de la Grèce orientale. Elles sont toutes fragmentaires, les plus intactes étant les deux exemplaires pl.10,a et b, tous deux de faibles dimensions.

Si l'on rapproche les catégories d'amphores pointues de Chypre, classées dans Gjerstad, Cypriote Pottery, Classification des Céramiques antiques 16, on comparera nos deux vases aux types des catégories VI et VII (Gjerstad, Cypriote Pottery, p.65-66). De ces deux catégories, datant de la seconde partie de la période cypriote-classique, la plus tardive VII comprend des spécimens plus élancés que la catégorie VI. Par leur forme, l'amphore pl.10,a et l'amphore pl.10,b se placent entre la catégorie VI (spécimens plus larges) et la catégorie VII (spécimens plus élancés).

Pour le vase de notre pl.10,a, qui appartient au groupe en forme de torpille, on comparera par exemple les vases cypriotes provenant des tombeaux de Vouni nos 14-16 (Swedish Cyprus Expedition III, pl.CVIII,1; et CIX,3; pour la date, voir texte ibid. p.338). Ces tombeaux datent de la première moitié du IV<sup>e</sup> siècle, c'est-à-dire qu'ils sont contemporains de la dernière période du palais, ou même plus tardifs; car la poterie y offre souvent des traits avancés qu'on ne trouve pas dans celle du palais. Voir aussi l'amphore chiote Hesperia III, p.202, fig.1, 1. Ces amphores chiotes pointues datent du milieu du Vme siècle ou d'un peu plus après (Hesperia IV, p.477 et 497).

En les mettant à côté de la nôtre (pl.10,b), on voit que celles de l'Agora sont moins élancées. Bien plus pansues que ces dernières sont par exemple les deux amphores Hesperia V, p.345, fig.12, également trouvées à l'Agora, qui datent de la première partie du Vme siècle. Comme, durant cette période, les formes se succèdent du plus pansu au plus élancé, il s'en suit que notre vase pl.10,b correspondrait aux amphores chiotes placées vers la fin du Vme siècle.

Qu'on regarde aussi les amorphisques pointus attiques, énumérés par M. Beazley dans le CVA. Oxford 1, p.31, à propos de l'amorphisque pointu à figures rouges du peintre d'Érétrie (Oxford 537, CVA. Oxford 1, III I, pl.40, 3-5). C'est parmi les plus tardifs de ces vases, qui datent des années 430 à 380, que notre petite amphore élancée trouve des parallèles.

De ces données on peut conclure que notre amphore pl.10,b doit appartenir à la première moitié du IVme siècle. On pourrait admettre la possibilité d'une date un peu antérieure, mais non postérieure. Ce vase est un des documents les plus importants de notre fouille. Il a été trouvé intact sur le site, près du vase pl.13,b, autre pièce intacte, et témoigne aujourd'hui de l'abandon de la ville phrygienne (cf. p.8). (Les cassures de la panse sont modernes, et dues à un coup de pioche malencontreux).

Les plus importants des fragments d'amphores pointues non reproduits sont:

Partie droite de l'anse d'une grande amphore à surface beige foncé, cette teinte pouvant être due à un engobe; l'argile est fine, de couleur rouge orangeâtre, chamois orangeâtre à la cassure; peu de mica; provenance P2.

Un pied plat de petite amphore, comme celui de la pl.10,a; la surface est beige, teinte peut-être due à un engobe; l'argile est assez fine,

de couleur chamois, rouge clair à la cassure; provenance, R2.

Un fragment de la base d'une petite amphore plus pansue que celle de la pl.10,b, mais munie du même pied à bouton; argile fine, rouge orangeâtre clair, chamois orangeâtre à la cassure; provenance, U2b.

D'autres fragments proviennent de P3 et M. Several days ago in my travels at Pitane-Gandarisi, where Prof. Akurgal is excavating the Achaei cemetery, a two handled amphora turned up with this stamp on one of the handles:




— I tried a rubbing with some of the tissues which you gave me a year or two ago, but they looked so wretched that I think a drawing of this very simple stamp is clearer.

The amphora itself is of an orange pink fabric, solid in the brece.

Narrow neck, with only a slight bulge at the lip. Broad, outflaring shoulder, narrowing to a point, but foot not preserved

Possibly a crumby sketch gives a clearer idea.....



The graves in this town, as in all the others at Gandarisi, are almost all of the 6<sup>th</sup> century B.C., with the exception of some scattered late 8<sup>th</sup> cent. - Early 4<sup>th</sup> Red Figured pieces from Kraters. This amphora was on a slightly higher level than most, & might possibly be later; we have not opened it yet, although several pieces are broken, and so can't tell you anything about the date of the contents, if there are any.

Pitane is listed by Herodotus (1.149) as one of the twelve cities of the Aeolic confederation; Pottery from the cemetery includes a great deal of Corinthian and Attic pottery, Chiot Chalices, local Aeolic "Myrina" wares, and imports from some of the finer "Wild Goat" schools to the south.

Could you write us what the stamp is? I suppose it's a very elementary one, but Prof. Akurgal was quite interested when he came a few days ago, and said that he had never seen one like it from Gandarisi in the past four years of excavation here.

You probably saw Dr. Edwards after the Gordon season — or perhaps you didn't, since he was rushing off to Cyprus after only

one or two nights in Athens. He looked in the pink (or bronzed tan) of health by mid-June. We had a very happy two and a half months' season. Joe last was there, and was particularly fun. - He is perfect company. Also Arlene Kringold and Dee Haviland. - A nice group.

Incidentally, you asked last winter after Hamit Koçay, and I think we spoke of his position in the Ethnological Museum in Ankara. Apparently he has not discontinued excavating, and dug a pre-historic site in the Van region a few years ago. This summer, however, he is beginning excavations again at Alaca Höyük, where he dug quite a few years ago.

I plan to be in Greece for a week or more in the second half of September, after the dig here closes. Hoping that you will be in Athens at that time, I will look forward to seeing you.

NOTE ON A STAMPED AMPHORA FOUND AT PITANE/CANDARLI  
IN THE SUMMER OF 1962

C. H. Greenewalt wrote to me on August 15, 1962, from the excavations at Pitane-Candarli (Borgama, Turkey), giving a description of a stamped amphora and a drawing of its stamp, and requesting comment. The letter, addressed to me in Athens, apparently was not received here until September 11, too late to be forwarded to me abroad.

The stamp is a monogram, apparently a combination of pi with upsilon. It seems to be closely similar to those of two Agora handles, SS 1083 and SS 11612 (they are not quite identical with each other). SS 11612 was found in context of the last quarter of the 4th century B.C. This context does not of course exclude earlier dates for individual finds. But actually up to now we have no firm context evidence for putting any combined letters (i.e. monograms rather than abbreviations) in stamps before about 350 B.C. (Do they come earlier in coins? Cf Hill, Principal Coins of the Greeks, pl.8, no.19; but this is not very clear; at least they seem to be not common.) For a published example of this monogram in a stamp, see E. M. Pridik, Inventory-catalogue of the Stamps on Handles and Necks of Amphoras, and on Bricks, of the Hermitage Collection, Petrograd 1917; pl.XVI, no. 49, from Kerch, see text p.106, no. 92.

Mr. Greenewalt tells me the amphora was one of many found at the site with small pots inside them, i.e. they had been used presumably as coffins for infants, like those found for instance by George Mylonas at Eleusis, cf ΗΠΑΚΤΙΚΑ, 1952, pp. 53-72; and 1954, p.59; or those found in an ancient cemetery on the west slopes of the acropolis at Samos (Boehlau, Aus Ionisch und Ital.Nekropolen, 1898, pp.23 ff., pp.144 ff.). In the stamped amphora from Pitane was found a "salt-cellar" with concave sides and good black glaze, as Mr. Greenewalt tells me; this was thought to be 4th century or earlier by Dr. Akurgal; a parallel shown to Lucy Talcott at the Athenian Agora suggested to her the mid-4th century, because of resemblance to finds from Olynthos.

I have not been able to identify a good parallel for the shape of the Pitane stamped amphora as shown in the small sketch in Mr. Greenewalt's letter. I would be very glad to have a photograph of it, preferably in good profile and printed to be rather accurately at 1 : 10, and accompanied at least by a height measurement.

Mr. Greenewalt asked what publications I would suggest as works of reference for amphora shapes. There is no one ideal book as yet. For shapes found in Athens, a fair representative selection is shown in my pamphlet Amphoras and the Ancient Wine Trade (1961), a copy of which I will send to Professor Akurgal. These are shown in photographs. A very much larger repertory is shown in profile drawings in I. B. Zeeat, Pottery Containers from the Bosphorus, Moscow, 1960 (in Russian).

A still larger repertory, is on file with me here at the Agora, on cards largely illustrated by photographs of the amphoras at 1:10. This covers our own collection (of 700-odd amphoras in our exhibition and storage) and also much supplementary material, partly from persons who have sent me photographs for comment. If Professor Akurgal cares to send me photographs of some of his amphoras, stamped or unstamped, I should be glad in return to tell him whatever I knew about them; it would be understood that I would publish nothing without specific permission.







Dear Miss Grace,

I'm afraid I can't tell you more about the stamped handles than Clarke has done as he was in charge of the small finds and therefore remembers them better than I. Curiously enough I can't find a note of them in the index. The building in our trench C seems to have been some sort of a commercial establishment; it produced in its two levels black glaze pottery dating from ca. end of the 5th century to something after the middle of the 4th; it doesn't seem to have been occupied as late as the last quarter of the century when Antigonos started to build the new city across the water. There is archaic slide (later 8th to beginning of 6th century) mixed in at all levels, and I think a certain amount of 5th century stuff extruded from a level which we have hardly begun to tap, but the great majority of finds from this trench are of the period ca. 400 - 340 B.C.

The commonest type of amphora, which was almost universal in the upper levels of the buildings is A: rolled rim, and tubular handle section, sharply angled shoulder, and pear-shaped foot. Less frequent is the overhanging lip (B) which seems to go with a more rounded shoulder and sharper junction of neck and shoulder. We can't join any necks and feet except in type A, as the whole material is badly comminuted. The alternative types of feet C and D seem to go with a more rounded profile than A; they were commoner in the lower than in the higher levels. Altogether nearly 350 amphora feet came to light in this 4th century building (area 130-140 sq.metres), and a high proportion of these were crushed in the collapse of the original building some time in the first half of the 4th century. The clay is firm and pinkish, no glaze.

The sketches are from memory, as work last summer wasn't far enough advanced for any vases to be made up and profiles drawn.







Dear M. Metzger,

It was delightful to catch a glimpse of you last autumn, and still more delightful of course in August 1960 when I met the Metzger family in the sea at Makry Ammon. I hope all are well.

Coming to grips with the publication of the amphoras found in the wreck off Antikythera (mentioned to you in my letter of March 10, 1960), I find that I never acknowledged (apparently) your letter of April 12, 1960, in which you sent me three more photographs of stamped handles found at Xanthos. Here enclosed are readings made from these stamps. No.1667, Late Knidian, is of the 1st century B.C., no.1975, Koan, may be of the same date (no direct excavation context for this type, but if it is an abbreviation for Τιγναν, Koan stamps with this name have a fair context at Nessana on the borders of Palestine, second half of 2nd to 1st half of 1st century B.C.; the publication of these is now in press, Nessana Vol.I, by H. D. Colt and others - in fact the proofs were finished long ago, and the volume is expected next month. Your no. 1976, Rhodian, is of the late 3rd or early 2nd century B.C.

If for any of your stamped handles you have any excavation context useful for dating, I should be obliged if you would tell me about it.

Dear M. Metzger,

I believe you are the one who will publish the pottery of Xanthos. So I am sending to you, here enclosed, a copy of our readings and restorations of the stamps of which you gave me photographs in October 1958, and of the stamp on the whole Rhodian amphora, no. 1860, of which M. Demargne gave me photographs in August 1954. I enclose also a note (dated 19.II.60) on these readings, etc., and particularly on the dates of the stamped jar and fragments.

The amphora no. 1860 is very important, in that the date suggested by the shape is so neatly confirmed and narrowed by the stamped name of the eponym Λυστρατος on one of its handles, which according to a probable identification with a known priest of Halios, should apparently date the jar late in the first quarter of the 1st century B.C. (see attached Note). In his very interesting publication, Xanthos I (1958), received recently by our School, M. Demargne suggests that these tombs, which resemble some in Sciatbi, were made in the early Hellenistic period. However, the Rhodian amphora no. 1860, and perhaps two or three other pottery finds, appear to indicate a re-use of Tomb 18 in the early 1st century B.C. (On the other published pots, I have consulted G. Roger Edwards).

I wonder if I might have permission to republish no. 1860? Besides being generally important for the study of stamped Rhodian amphoras (the name is still very rare on known stamps), the jar is probably the best parallel available for a Rhodian found in the Antikythera wreck. A group of us are planning to republish this wreck, with contributions on glass, pottery, etc. I should like to illustrate no. 1860 in my section.

If I may have permission to do this, would it be possible some time to have the jar rephotographed, so as to be in full profile? The photograph I have, which

- 2 -

is the one in the publication, is fine and sharp, but the tipping of the jar makes it difficult to use in close comparisons of shape.

I should be much interested also to see photographs of useful parts of the two broken Rhodian amphoras mentioned on p. 63.

Finally, unless the surface is all gone, rubbings or photographs of the stamp on the second handle of no. 1860 might lead to a reading of that stamp, with the help of the extensive files we now have here.

Please use the enclosed notes, readings, etc. in any way they may be helpful. I hope they have not arrived too late. If you plan to quote me in publication, I should like to see that part of the text before it is printed.

Attached are the readings of 12 handles and one whole jar, of which photographs were given to me by M. Demargne on 6.VII.54 (profile and one stamped handle, of the whole jar only, no. 1860) and by M. Metzger (all the loose handles). The readings have been ~~arranged~~<sup>27.X.58</sup> in order of inventory numbers, but probably the jar 1860 belongs to a different number series, since it was found in 1953, while the rest were I believe all found in 1957.

The greater part of this material is dateable in the first century B.C.: the 3 Knidian, nos. 1453, 1454, and 3101; of the Rhodian, the whole jar no. 1860, and the handles nos. 3096, 3103, 3108 and 3108 bis (according to its appearance - could not be read), likely also 3104; likely also no. 3102, of unknown origin, perhaps Roman. <sup>(X)</sup> The Knidian no. 3101 belongs to the series of Pnyx no. 168 (Hesperia Suppl. X, p. 160), while the other two belong to the series of Rhodian Pnyx 169 (same page). The whole <sup>A</sup>amphora is dated in the term of the eponym ΛΥΣΙΕΤΡΑΤΟΣ, who may be identified with A. MOIPARENEYΣ, a known priest of Halios, who held this office no doubt soon after he was priest of Athana Lindia in 82 B.C. (cf Lindos II, pp. 129 and 130; Cl. Rhodes II, p. 201). (Also Hesp. XXII, 1953, p. 127)

Of the remaining <sup>3</sup> handles, 3097 is about 3rd quarter of 2nd century B.C., 1452 probably somewhere about 200 B.C., and 3088 somewhere about 300 BC. These are all Rhodian.

I fear he deliberately <sup>had</sup> <sup>in mind</sup> giving my date for this jar to make things fit together more easily, with his <sup>historical</sup> <sup>periods and</sup> <sup>concerning</sup> dates at Scutellae for the first of tomb, see p. 64.

Actually, he does not draw any <sup>sold</sup> independent dates for individual objects by analogy with dates objects

elsewhere. On the glass bowl:



Yes, the Burns hope to be in Athens with another string of tourists in August, arriving on the 2nd by air, an amenity we have not enjoyed since the dear old war; also to have a week or so later, about the 16th to 23rd, without our tourists, which will be even better.

But be of good cheer, you certainly thanked us for the 1954 photographs! The only thing I haven't heard about, and about which you may have turned up a memo., was a note I sent you this academic year, with a note of a specimen which I picked up on the low mound by the sea at Pompeiopolis in Cilicia: an oblong stamp on the top of an angular handle, with the legend :-  
and a wand with ribbons below (caduceus ?)  
Do tell me who he was ! (distaff?)



A most exciting little thing happened here the other day. I was showing some students my bits and pieces, including a chip of worked marble/which I picked up about half way down to the sea below the temple at Sunium in 1928, on my first visit to Greece. I thought of it as something architectural, though I was always a bit puzzled, as I couldn't remember seeing anything like it, and also it is slightly (very slightly) out of the straight. I began to wonder if it was from sculture, and one of the students said "Could it be a bit of hair ?" So I looked up the Sunium kouros; and lo, I am all but certain that it is the (the only) missing bit of the hair of that statue ! Don't tell Karouzos, I want to give him a surprise. Either I will bring it, or send it through the Greek Embassy; the new ambassador, you know, is George Séfèris, an old buddy of ours from 1940; what fun it is going to be to tell him!

Love to the Athenians, especially Lucy Talcott; tell her I am slightly afraid to look her in the face after a shambles last year

when I misunderstood her instructions and let her in for some trouble  
But we will look in and hope still to be personae gratae.
