USSR - GRAKAN

Dear Mr. Blackman:

I think it a very good idea for you to go and look at the IOSPE III manuscript in Moscow. Let me tell you the news of it which I received from Joseph Brashinsky in his letter of Feb. 25, 1972:

"The manuscript of the Pridik-Grakov Cprpus is now kept in the Archives of the Institute of Archeology in Moscow. It concerns more than 32,000 stamps to 1955. It is doubtful that it will aver be published. In the meanwhile nobody is occupied with supplementing the Corpus." Grakov died in September 1950 1970. Pridik had turned the corpus over to him in the 1920s.

The article you mention is Y., Vinogradov, "Pottery stamps of the island of Thasos," <u>Numismatics and Epigraphy</u>, X, The Institute of Archeology of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR, Moscow, 1972, pp. 3-63. (All this in Russian of course.) On p. 4 of this, V. states that IOSPE III, though unpublished, was "completed after IOSPE III the (2nd World) war." V. always alludes to this work as if it were available to the schelarly world, and is or should be an influence on our work. So nobody should object to your asking to study it. V. was Crakov's student, and dedicates his article to Grakov, and cites freely his unpublished manuscripts. Another of these which is constantly cited both by V. and by many other Russien scholars is and dated 1939, also in the Archives, where it is numbered d. 538, see Vinogradov op. cit., note 7; its title is something like "Stamped pottery ware of the Hellenistic period as a source for the history of manufacture and trade." I must say that I take an interest in this also. Grakow was a good scholar. I fear however that these works are far from being druckfertig. I hope they are typescripts.

Dear Miss Grace,

I mentioned recently to Professor E.G. Turner the fact that I had discovered, through conversation with you, that the unpublished Volume III of IOSPE ("Inscriptions on utensils, especially amphora handles") existed as a typescript in Moscow in the Institute of Archaeology. He is encouraging me to apply for a grant from the British Academy to pay a brief visit to Moscow in order to have a look at this typescript and see whether arrangements can be made for it to be copied and possibly translated, if not formally published. Professor Turner has offered to act as one referee to support my application and I wondered if you would be willing to act as the other. If you are, I will send you a copy of my formal application, which has to be in by the end of March, if I am to be considered for a grant during the next year. I may well then have, somewhat unexpectedly, the time to pay such a visit, since my original plans for ways of spending some leave next year have fallen through. I see from my notes that we tracked down the existence of this typescript from a reference in an article by the Vinogradov, which you showed me in the Agora Museum. I should be most grateful if you could give me the reference for this article which I do not seem to have noted.
