This material had been worked on by Chrysoske Kardane many years ago, but she did not succeed in bringing it to a publication. My recollection is that she got stuck where there was for a time difference of opinion on 3rd and 4th, brought to a sharpness over the publication of Kardane's stuff, followed by my difficulties over how their dating did not fit with the <sup>whole</sup> Thompson dating, i.e. of his Group B. Chrysoske seems not to have recovered from this mix-up, and her stuff remained unpublished. It is being brought out by V. A.

Most of the Isthmia material I remembered from Chrysoske's day, but V. A. also showed me photos of a Ptolemaic (?) amphora, like the stuff from the Soree Limn. road. This one has a stamp not found in our files by A.D.

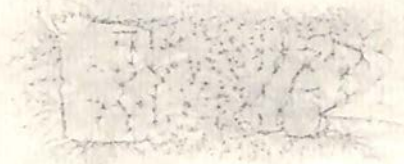

# ISTHMLA EXCAVATIONS

1984-1985

By the end of the summer of 1985 the final texts of substantial parts of the report of our excavations 1967-1978 were either finished or well begun. Professor Birgitta L. Wohl (California State University Northridge) spent July and parts of June and August on the Isthmus to confront the Excavation's lamps one more time. She has now written the text of the catalogue, part in rough draft, and the commentary to accompany it, part in a finished and polished version. Professor Timothy E. Gregory (Ohio State University) was in Greece for the four-month period May-August. When he left, he submitted

the text of eleven of the twelve chapters into which he has divided his study of the Hexamilion; he also provided a selection and tentative layout of the illustrations, both photographs and drawings. The text for Chapter III, Testimonia, and the footnotes for all are still to come. During his stay in Greece Professor Gregory supervised a magnetometer survey of parts of the Sanctuary. The survey was made under the patronage of Ohio State University and was not a part of the program of Isthmia Excavations (UCLA); the work will be fully reported by Professor Gregory elsewhere. Professor Michael Mills (University of New Brunswick) spent most of his time in Greece working in the library of the American School to collect the literature relevant to his study of tile stamps. He has assembled and xeroxed and apparatus that will



enable him to write the first draft of his monograph in Canada during the current winter. As last year, Professor Mills's expenses in Greece were in part borne by his University and in part by himself. Margaret MacVeagh Thorne was in Greece for three weeks in July and August. She duplicated her notes on approximately twenty-five of the West Cemetery graves and left this material on file with other Excavation records.

Dr. Gerhard Schmidt, occupied with his duties at the Central Office of the German Archaeological Institute in Berlin, reports no progress in his study of Isthmia figural terracottas. Professor Harrienne Mills (Kenyon College) on her way to the Excavation House at Kyras Vrysi on the second day of her arrival

in Greece at the end of June had a motorcycle accident at the Bridge and, after a period in the Evangelismos Hospital in Athens, was compelled to return to the United States. She was very much missed during the summer, and her assignment (miscellaneous finds) was not advanced.

Paul A. Clement (UCLA, emeritus) has completed the text for the publication of coins found 1967-1978, and is now checking internal and external references and selecting coins for illustration. He is also writing an account of the excavations 1967-1978, organized area by area, to serve as a general introduction to work done under his direction during these years.



In the period now under review a prototype model of the new Ibycus "Infant" being developed by Dr. David W. Packard was put at the disposal of the Excavations. The first manuscript to be read into the new computer was the completed Catalogue of Coins 1967-1978 translated into Ibyx, the computer's language, by an optical character reader from copy prepared on an IBM Selectric typewriter. Numismatic letters and characters, handwritten in the typed manuscript and not successfully interpreted by the ocr, were keyboarded into the computerized text from a font of numismatic characters specially designed by Dr. Packard for this manuscript. Subsequent editorial work on the Catalogue and all writing for the rest of the "coin volume" is being done, or has been done, directly

on the computer. Moreover, other manuscripts in preparation, as soon as any degree of consecutive text is ready, however incomplete or complete, are read into the computer, and these versions become the basis of subsequent work. This facilitates editorial work by author and by the director of excavations.

In addition to the coin volume our computer files contain what is written of Professor Gregory's Hexamilion, Professor Lattimore's Sculpture (now being translated into Ibyx by an ocr in the United States), Professor Wohl's Lamps, and Dr. Jordan's revised text of the inscription inventory. We hope and expect to be able to submit to the Editor of School Publications in Princeton the complete text of our reports on floppy disks



for automatic transfer to the tape of the School's Ibycus printing system there established and so eliminate any need for the retyping of manuscript in Princeton. This has the advantage of reducing the possibility of the introduction of error at that stage and may well turn out to have other advantages in expediting the transfer of finished manuscript to printed page.

We had all hoped to see in print by the end of the triennium 1981-1984 a substantial part of the results of the excavations 1967-1978. We are close to accomplishing this except for pottery where achievement has been disappointing. With the publication of our excavations 1967-1978 we shall not yet have discharged our obligation to bring to an end the work we have started. An important

part of the Roman Bath remains unexplored and the underlying structures have hardly been investigated at all. There has been little exploration of the field in which the Bath lies. And the plot of ground at the northwest corner of the Sanctuary, across the street from the Excavation House, where lies a vaulted tunnel at the head of a ravine, partly underground, which runs down past the Roman Bath to a bay of the great Kyras Vrysi Ravine, must be excavated to complete an investigation begun by Oscar Broneer near the area several years ago. All this land belongs to us and it is our duty to exploit it. This work will be phase three of our program and its publication phase four. During phase three the splendid floor mosaic in Room VI of the Roman Bath must be lifted, repaired, and securely reset in place. Meanwhile, the printing of work accomplished in phase one



continues to concern us all.

In closing this report I present a coin found among the ruins of East Field houses in 1971. It illustrates an interesting, perhaps amusing problem of attribution.

IC 71-130. East Field. Æ 21 mm. 3.33 g. ↑

IOVAIA---- Bust r., draped, with necklace.

Rev. Athena l., helmeted, with spear and patera, apparently pouring libation at low altar.

If the reverse legend be read Α[ΘΗ]ΝΑΙΩΝ, the attribution must be Athens under Julia Domna 193-211, in spite of the belief held, I believe by all numismatists, that Athens struck neither name nor portrait of members of the ruling house on its

"imperialists". The alternative is Methone of Messenia (preferred by N.K. Rutter), reading [MO]Θ[Ω]ΝΑΙΩΝ (cf. BMC Peloponnesus, p. 117, no.2). If in fact the apex of the initial omega is preserved in the defaced area over Athena's helmet, the reading becomes [MO]ΘΩΝΑΙΩΝ and attribution to Methone irresistible. I refrain here from the problem of allocating coins between Methone of Messenia and Methone of the Argolid, except to note that the city on the Saronic Gulf is far more accessible to the Poseidon Sanctuary on the Isthmus.

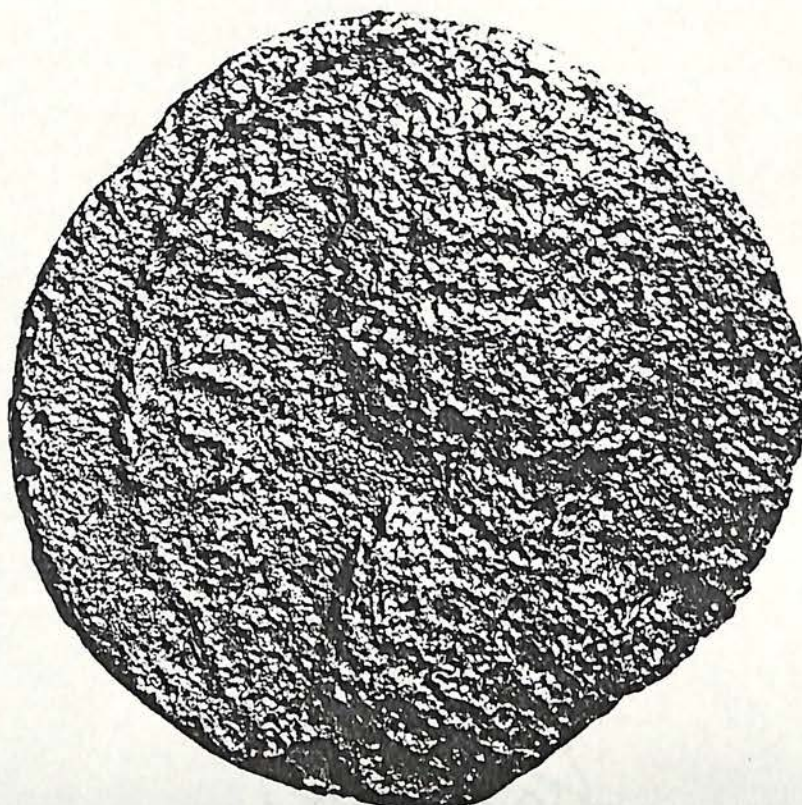

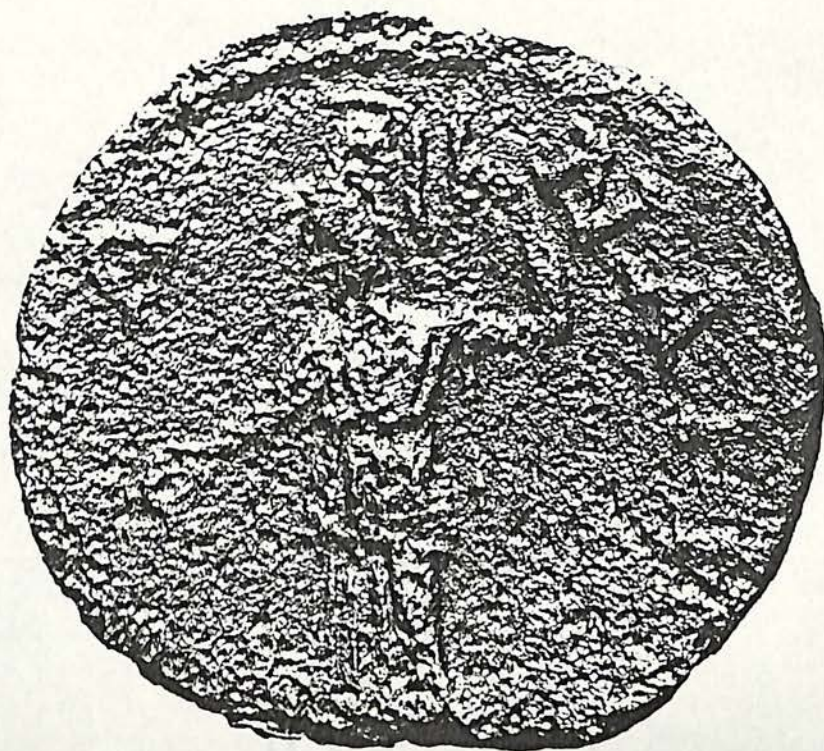

## TRIP TO OLD CORINTH

FRI. AUG. 4 Arrived about 11:30 A.M. & dropped baggage w/ Sarah at Spiro's. Found Mr. O. Broneer at his house & went with him to the new museum to check out a key to the old museum & to check in w/ Spiro.

P.M.: Re-ordered Isthmia SAH as more convenient, studying esp. Corinthian A & B handles as I went. Sized up photography situation: for SAH, upstairs in loft by left-hand window; afternoon light reflected off stone foundations below = good. For whole amphoras, outside in front of apotheker on the left, in early A.M. before sun hits the wall, = best. Vase tripods = scarce in old museum & even at Corinth excavations, it seems.

SAT. AUG. 5 Set up apparatus for SAH photography, & progressed slowly through Corinthian A & B handles. Took measurements of handles as well.

SUN. AUG. 6 Cont. w/ photography & measuring of Corinthian SAH. Odd jobs covered during these three days: glued IP 1693 & 1695 tog.; found IP 587 = no. of jar atop high case in entranceway (O.A.S.). Studied problematical stamps. Asked Mr. Broneer about frags. from Pachi (labels in boxes on shelf-table in upper loft) & about things under loft (belong to much earlier excavation period; he couldn't give me any more information than that). He will go through the IP cards w/ me later & check on contexts. He has not yet written Mr. Amyx about the coarseware, i.e. amphoras & SAH & their publishing assignment, but will soon do so.



## OLD CORINTH - CONT.

MON. AUG. 7

Began photographing Miss Isthmia SAH. Mr. Williams came in to discuss my project. He gave me permission to use all the material from Corinth, & explained arrangements for moving Corinthian A & B material from Corinth excavations into the apotheka to the left (as one enters) of the old museum. New shelves will be built & amphoras transferred from new museum storage; eventually SAH drawers of Corinthian A & B can be moved there too, while I am working on them. He then took me (w/ the new secretary, Jeanne Mackintosh) through the new museum storerooms, pointing out exs. of Cor. A & B in various stages of processing. Pre-war material = at old museum. Jars from '71 & '72 seasons = kept isolated pending publications for the time being. In general, only stamped amphoras & frags. - inventoried; a good deal of uninventoried material is stored in lots, & will need to be examined eventually. At the moment, many jars in this category are restored as much as possible, photographed, & then broken down & ~~then discarded~~ <sup>discarded</sup> except for the necks. Some from this year's excavation are slated for the same process, but for the time being will be taken to the new storage in the old museum apotheka for me to have for study & then to discard. Discussed my schedule for rest of summer & next year. I shall spend the rest of my time here, <sup>this week</sup> ascertaining the amount of material to be covered, so that I can gauge how much time I'll need next summer; Mr. Williams will need to know. Spent rest of A.M. looking at inventoried Cor A & B material; began list to finish later.

MON. AUG. 7  
(CONT.)

after a swim, returned to work on Isthmia material, & cont. photographing other classes. Looked for lger frags. of Cor A & B amphoras, measured them & made preparations for photographing them Tues.

TUES. AUG. 8

Photographed frags. & 2 whole amphoras outside against the West side of the old museum. Had tour of the Robinson excavation by ~~the~~<sup>its</sup> director himself. (Mr. Williams was away in Athens.) Looked again at items in new museum. Studied Isthmia Cor A & B exx, taking extra rubbings, checking for exx. of the same die, etc. Finished SAH photography.

WED. AUG. 9

Went through IP cards w/ Mr. Broneer at his house, checking for SAH missing in the Old Museum (found 8, from 1960 excavations). Looked up context data in excavation notebooks, which = also at his house. Concentrated on Rachē deposits.

Began taking rubbings of Cor A SAH from Corinth.

THURS. AUG. 10

Rode w/ Jeanne Marty & Soulis in the Land Rover → the Isthmia site, picking up passengers & breakfast en route. After consuming the latter, Jeanne & I looked for frags. of Cor A & B amphoras: found 2 significant ones, which I measured & photographed. We then looked for any other amphoras or SAH from Broneer excavations which might have ended up in an apothēkē - but none turned up.



THURS. AUG. 10  
(CONT.)

Had lunch at the Casino at the bottom of the Corinth canal, & was driven back → Old Corinth. Went to the New Museum to take more rubbings, & to check readings. Also compared dies of Isthmia Corinthian stamps, after the new museum closed.

FRI. AUG. 11

Finished with Isthmia Corinthian handles, & packed away photographic equipment et al., & put away drawers & amphoras. Reported to Mr. Brouce on my Isthmia trip. Spent the rest of my time on SAH from Corinth, taking rubbings & checking numbers of handles in drawers w/ those on kartoules. After a very pleasant tea at Hill House, we headed back → Athens in the white Fancia driven by Mr. Williams.

Saw Met Mr. Radolf in the New Museum, who has been working at Halos

## Isthmia Excavations (UCLA)

1983--1984

Of those now actively engaged in preparing for publication the results of Isthmia Excavations 1967--1978, six were in residence on the Isthmus during some part of the period of this report.

Professor Birgitta L. Wohl, California State University Northridge, continued her work on lamps. She has finished a first draft of the text of about three quarters of the catalogue. The remaining quarter and a narrative introduction and summary for the whole she expects to complete by the end of the summer of 1985. Professor Wohl will be in residence at her University during the academic year 1984--1985. The summer months of 1985 she will devote to her obligations to Isthmia Excavations.

Professor Timothy E. Gregory, Ohio State University, was in residence from 20 April to the end of August. He has written a text of most of his monograph on the Hexamilion and revisions of part. He is expected to finish the work during the summer of 1985. Fall and Winter Quarters of the academic year 1984--1985 he will be in residence at his University. The Spring Quarter he will

return to Isthmia to direct a magnetometer survey of two fields which lie between the Roman Bath and the west wall of the Hexamilion Fortress and indeed the area which lies within the Fortress itself. The size of the former is about 10,000 m<sup>2</sup>, of the latter about 30,000 m<sup>2</sup>. This work is financed by Ohio State University and concerns students of that institution and faculty other than Professor Gregory. It is of interest to Isthmia Excavations, which cooperate fully with the programme, but not a part of Isthmia Excavations' current obligations.

Professor Michael Mills, University of New Brunswick, was on the Isthmus 31 May to the end of August. I quote his report:

"This summer I have completed my initial survey of all our stamped tiles. I have recorded on my specially printed inventory-cards all relevant data concerning the fragments themselves (dimensions, state of preservation, type of fabric, colour according to Munsell), their stamps (text or pattern, letter-type, dimensions) and their find-spots (date of find, location, level, associations mentioned in the field-books). As a result I have been able to divide our 238 stamped tiles into 23 categories, some with variant stamps within the

same category. I have, in addition, distinguished 14 other stamps, of which we have only singular examples. I am now in a position to begin the first draft of the catalogue and to proceed to the literature."

Professor Mills' expenses have been in part met by a grant to him of \$1,500 Canadian from his University and for the rest they have been met from his own pocket. He will return in the summer of 1985 and expects to finish his manuscript then, including plate layouts.

Professor Harrienne Mills, Kenyon College, was in Greece 21 May to the end of August. In the miscellaneous finds she is concerned to publish she has some 550 objects. For about half of these she has now compiled a catalogue card-file based on study of the objects and on inspection of the inventory records.

Professor Steven Lattimore, UCLA, has completed his distinguished work on the sculpture found between 1967 and 1978 and the finished manuscript, both text and plates, is now in Greece for final review.



Dr. David Jordan, American School of Classical Studies and University of Virginia, Charlottesville, made several visits to the Isthmus to check details concerning inscriptions he is preparing for publication. His work can be considered as essentially finished (see "Isthmia Excavations 1982--1983", p. 6).

Margaret MacVeagh Thorne, who is responsible for the publication of the West Cemetery with its pottery of the sixth and fifth centuries before Christ, excavated by us in 1967 and 1968, reports from Cambridge (Massachusetts) that she makes slow progress at the moment, though part of the text of the catalogue is in manuscript. She is expected in Greece again in January and February of the coming winter.

Dr. Gerhard Schmidt, now at the German Archaeological Institute in Berlin, was at the Excavation House several times during the summer to compile data for his study of terracotta figurines 1967--1978. His completed manuscript is expected by the end of the coming year.

From Dr. Jeanne Marty, who has undertaken to revise for publication her dissertation concerned with deposits of Roman pottery found in our excavations 1967--1978, successfully submitted to the University of Pennsylvania in 1979 as a requirement for her

doctorate, there has been during the current year no report.

The architect Charles Peirce worked with us again this year, in residence at Kyras Vrysi (and Corinth) from 9 July to 9 October. He completed the series of drawings which will be used to illustrate Professor Gregory's monograph on the Hexamilion. The architect William B. Dinsmoor, Jr., American School of Classical Studies, Agora Excavations, spent considerable time with T.E. Gregory and the undersigned working over proofs of "The Roman Arch," which is scheduled for publication in Hesperia for 1984.

Paul A. Clement, UCLA (retired), has carried on the administrative duties of the enterprise, whether in Athens or on the Isthmus, has supervised the typing of the final version of the catalogue of coins with its scattering of corrections and revisions, and is addressing himself to the writing of the introductory narrative for the catalogue.



I append to this report illustrations of an attractive bronze coin (IC 71-149) struck at Corinth during the reign of Commodus (176-192). It was found in our excavations of 1971 in the East Field contiguous to Poseidon's temple precinct and is perhaps the clearest existing picture of the "temple" of Palaemon which stood just south of Poseidon's — see Broneer, Isthmia, II (Princeton, 1973), pp. 109-112, frontispiece, plate 65, and plan IV, which do not follow the indications of this coin, and p. 110, note 14 with pl. 42, a-b, which wrongly dates it in the reign of Caracalla (198-217).

Dear Professor Clement,

My expedition to Ishmia last August 10 proved quite helpful for my studies on Corinthian amphoras, and I want to thank both you and Jeanne Marty, who gave me warm and generous assistance in every way.

Besides the fragments of two large Corinthian A amphoras (IPG 68-259 and 68-260), I looked at the partially restored jar IPG 68-184 belonging to the same class, and the neck and handle IPG 68-252 preserved from a Corinthian B amphora. The former can probably be dated to the fifth century, and the latter is similar to others dated before 480 B.C. In any case, my research is far from finished at this point, and eventually I hope to be able to say more about these jars. I took notes and photographs for study, and when results and prints are ready I shall be happy to send you copies.

I also took rubbings from the Rhodian handle IP 3659 found during the 1967 excavations in the theater. The stamp seems to read ΕΠΙ ΕΥΔΑΜΟΥ ΒΑΛΙΟΥ (retrograde), in which case it is a new type for us. The Rhodian eponym Eudamos can be dated just before 146 B.C.

Thank you again for your help and interest. If I miss seeing you before I leave for Princeton, I'll look forward to a chat either at the December meetings or next summer upon my return.

While I am wrapping up this summer's work on my Corinthian amphora project, I wanted to thank you again for all your interest and help. I had hoped to have prints of the photographs I took of Isthmia amphoras and handles and duplicates of readings on the new stamped handles to send you by now, but neither can be ready for some time yet. When all have been processed, we shall forward them to you--though the prints may have to wait until my return next summer.

I have written Professor Amyx to explain my project, as you suggested, and enclose a copy of my letter. He had already responded to Miss Grace's mention of my work with a gracious answer (of which you have a phototype from Miss Grace, I believe) that he had not intended to deal with these amphoras or stamps, and was happy that someone else might. I hope that I shall eventually be able to do so.

At present I plan to return to Greece next year about mid-summer, and shall probably spend most of August in Old Corinth tackling the Corinthian A and B material excavated there. I shall look forward to seeing you then!

Apropos of Corinthian pottery, and of Isthmia pottery: on Homer Thompson's Carolyn Koehler, suggestion, we have a Vassar girl here who was later - is now - a graduate student at Princeton, and who is taking part of my material for a dissertation, the study of two series of amphoras that may both be products of Corinth. (You can see them at an early stage in my Picture Book, fig. 35, the jar far left and the bright jar front left.) See "Samian Amph.", note 56 and accompanying text.) (ISTHMIAN MATERIAL)

- 29.VI.72 ~~XX~~Departed from 54 Souidias at 8:00 A.M. in the company of Mr. Oscar Broneer, who ushered me through the various stages of the bus route to Old Corinth. Cost: taxi, <sup>2x</sup>/30 dr.; bus, 68 dr. (round trip) plus 2x4 dr. Mr. Broneer checked out the key to the Old Museum at Corinth, where the Isthmia finds are stored, and after a very pleasant lun~~ch~~h at his house, he showed me around the museum.
- Began with the SAH drawers, checking readings and rubbings on the type cards of the two Corinthian classes, and on the set of kartoules from Isthmia. Took additional rubbings where needed for clarity or to paste on the kartoules. Put handles in the two drawers in numerical order.
- 30.VI.72 Finished checking and rubbing the rest of the handles in the two drawers, and did those lying out on the table upstairs. All handles listed in the duplicate sheets of 1-2.VIII.58 were found and examined by me. The next and more difficult problem was to search for the larger frags. of amphoras which were listed by Miss Grace on 16.VIII.58 from IP cards and which proved inaccessible due to crowded conditions in the old museum at that time; these frags. were not on file with us. This material is now scattered in various cases in the old museum, and on tables and shelves here and there, in the entranceway and the main Isthmia room and upstairs. I eventually found 17 of the 29 items; the rest may be in the main Corinth museum, and/or temporarily hiding amid the confusion attendant upon the move in progress to the new Isthmia museum.
- Friday eve. was devoted to the great Panegyris: a trek with Mr. Broneer to the church of Hosias and Damionas to light a candle (after forming part of the enormous crush for almost an hour) and <sup>to</sup> view the carnival; a dinner of roast pig and beer procured in the agora; and finally more

pig and beer at one of the restaurants in the agora with Georgia and her family, not to mention a good bit of real Greek dancing!

- 1.VII.72 Began the day with the harvest of SAH brought up since 1958: 10 total, which I examined, rubbed, and took notes on. Then finished casing the museum for the still-uncovered items on Miss Grace's list of 16.VIII.58. In the course of my search, I came upon and dealt with fragments of amphoras which had appeared after our records were made in 1958, and noted several large fragments of Corcyrean amphoras lurking in various corners, unnumbered--or so it seemed from a somewhat cursory inspection. Cogitated about a photographic setup, and tried a shot of a Corinthian A and a Corcyrean amphora with my own camera in the main doorway of the museum about noontime. Finished by looking over the main bulk of the handles again, in order to gain some sort of an overall impression. Returned to my comfortable room at Spiro's (upstairs, north and east exposure, corner with wonderful breezes ~~5~~/private bath) to put myself together before returning the key to Mr. Broneer. Did so, and found Spiro at the main Corinth museum in order to pay for my room (70 dr./night).

On Friday, May 15, I went to Corinth with the Corliss Lamonts, and the driver Jean Spyraakis, leaving the Grande Bretagne at 10:00 a.m. After showing them the temple of Apollo, and finding for them Peirene, I left them with the Guide to Corinth, and went to the Museum to get out the Corinth handle of which a photo was most urgently needed (Co 138, non-double Koan), and to arrange to photograph in the old parartema. Called on the Gaskeys and Henry S. R. and his excavators and Perry Bialor at the lunch table. Had lunch with the Lamonts at the Tourist Pavilion; by this time it was raining. After lunch it cleared a little, and they climbed Akro after a call at the Museum.

While they climbed (by car to the gate, and with Spyraakis as guide to Upper Peirene)(and a shepherd beyond), I photographed Co 138, and then, the apparatus being all set up, did also 14 handles from Isthmia which had been marked as new or superior examples; I used the duplicates made from the rubbings, and began at the beginning. There seem to be about 60 more Isthmia handles which need photographs; owing to there being a prevalence of "Coreycean" there are an unusual number that don't quite duplicate what we have on file. Photographs were on Rolls 442 and 443 (both short, 20-exp.). I left the ground glass (wrapped, with my name on it) on a shelf in the parartema on top of some boxes of older Broneer (?) finds. I put away all Isthmia handles taken out, and returned Co 138 to Vangeli to put away. No time or weather to take the romantic shot of jars ~~frs~~ dated by the destruction of Corinth, needed for the Picture Book; I assembled the two jars, C 47 838b (Co 245) and C 47 840, in the left corner of the parartema as you go in, and suggested to JLC he might like to photograph them for me, with a distant view of the temple in the background. *(But he did not.)*

The Lamonts and I had tea with the group at the dig house, and then went back to Athens.

While I was in Corinth over the 15<sup>th</sup> August Holiday, working on the SAH from Isthmia in the Old Museum, had a look at the jars being glued together from the Justinian Wall at Isthmia. This is about where the "umbrella stands" were found that have been puzzling O.B., but I think the latter are post construction of wall, while the jars are contemporary with it. On this visit, I did not bring a camera, and Mr. Benacik took a few shots for me of Isthmia fragments, for study purposes. Attached are two showing the jars of the Justinian Wall, datable by context in the 6<sup>th</sup> cent. A.D.

~~For the~~ For the one to the left, see our Oriental series stored on shelf 8 N 2, none of which however is so fat. Best parallel for the combination of types, see jars found at Jerash(?) in context of Justinian, known to me by Duncan, Corpus of Pal. Pottery (1930), 48 X and 48 Y. For the upper to the right, cf. our 8 S 3 series, also Throokmorton's Yasi Ada no. 31. Wood 2 (which however has a funny top).

In the foregoing list, where no date appears, the date is that of the preceding item, e.g., the last ten items on p. 2 were all found on 23.III.56 according to notebook and/or locations given on inventory cards.

The fragments called "Corinthian" in the lists derive from amphoras like e.g. IP 1437, or Corinth 40-404 (see Hesperia 1948, p.233, E 13; 4th century B.C.). The clay is coarse, full of large bits. Cf fabric of Corinthian tiles and mortars, also, I believe t.c. sculpture. The surface of the amphoras is rough.

"Corcyrean" fragments come from jars of quite different shape and clay. For large fragments from Isthmia, cf IP 582 and 584 which may be top and bottom of the same jar; also, I think, IP 878, whole jar, but owing to the piled-up sherd trays, I could not really see it on my visit of VIII.58. The fine clay of this series, especially when fired pale (sometimes greenish) buff, also suggests a possible Corinthian source. Corcyra however may also be suggested as the provenance, partly because of the coin type here represented on IP 728; see further Hesperia 1953, p. 109, upper left paragraph. A lot of jars of this class have been found in the sea off the west coast of Greece. (Now in the Patras museum.)

A noticeable characteristic of the "Corcyrean" fragments, in addition to the trace peculiar rim which is recognizeable when any part of it is preserved, is the fact that the stamp often appears on or near the lower attachment of the handle instead of on top. The rather soft pale buff clay above-mentioned also makes the earlier handles of this class easy to distinguish, but before the end of the 4th century the clay, still fine, is fired hard and red.

Date of the cistern, according to the SAH: Note in the lists that the upper earth produced 6 handles (2 Thasian and 4 Rhodian) datable in the 1st half of the 3rd cent. BC, the latest being perhaps IP 704, about the middle of the 3rd cent. I don't know whether there was a stratigraphic change at the level where the "vertical trench" was started, but certainly no SAH known to be as late as the 3rd cent. appeared in the lower earth (either in the sample taken out in XI.55, or in the larger remainder cleared in III.56). There is here a marked difference from the upper earth in the proportion of foreign to local (or Empire) production, and the only independently dated items in the lower earth are of the second half of the 4th cent.
