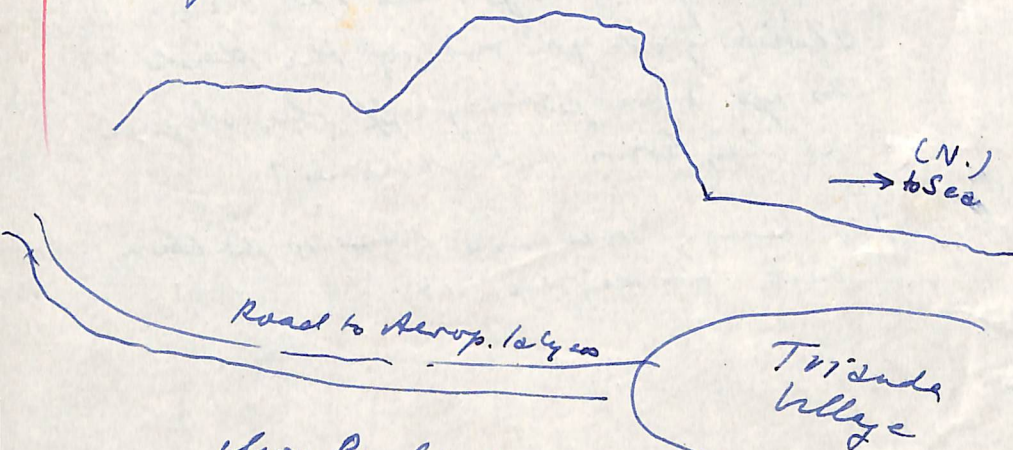

at Ialysos on a trip we took. If my
identification from the map is correct -
and I could not find anybody in a hurry
there to confirm it - it comes from a lioness
called chosio Vennia on the chal. plains of
Ialysos region, which adjoins the tip of
hill of chosio Vennia - where the chal. tombs
were found.



Miss Bay Bird said she found it
on a sort of pebble floor where several
potteries were still sitting - presumably
part of chal. excav.

I am also adding a bit of
Türk Pare to your fund of
left-overs.

Dear Mr. Kondis,

I am preparing a report for BCH on the stamped handles found in Delos, and in this connection want to be sure you are willing that I should publish the photograph of one of your Rhodian handles. This is a duplicate of a stamp found in ~~Rhodes~~ Delos, but in your example one can read the name, which is new, while in the Delos example this name is not preserved. This is an important handle, which it will be good to have published. It is the one showing the quadriga of Helios.

I am so sorry you did not have time to see us when you were in Athens, and I hope there will be another visit soon.

Dear Miss Maltby,

With the help of your rubbings, we have been able to see that your stamped handle, though found in Rhodes, is not Rhodian but Knidian. My colleague here, Mr. Dimoulis, has identified your stamp as an example of Knidian Type 1538. I give the reading here, with pencil brackets to shut out parts present in the die but apparently not impressed (or worn away) in your impression:

ANAPSN APIZTOKAHE APTENON
bull's head facing

I enclose rubbings of a better-preserved example of this type from the Athenian Agora (SS 10684). KT 1538 is one of a pair of types which were impressed each on one handle of a Knidian amphora. In your type are the names of a pair of commissioners, introduced by their title, ANAPSN, The (Two) Men, and so I call them Duoviri, a term up to now applied to commissioners named on (somewhat later) coins. In this case, with the names in the nominative, the form ought to be ANAPEE, but these people - the die engravers - were far from literary and one does find mistakes.

You can look up about this kind of stamp in my pamphlet Amphoras and the Ancient Wine Trade (1961), text with figures 64-5. Or if you want to go further, see Exploration archéologique de Délos, vol. 27 (1970), pp. 317-324, and pl. 340 under no. 131, where there is a study of this very stamp type; unfortunately the example was poor and is not illustrated.

The date of your stamp is shortly after 100 B.C.

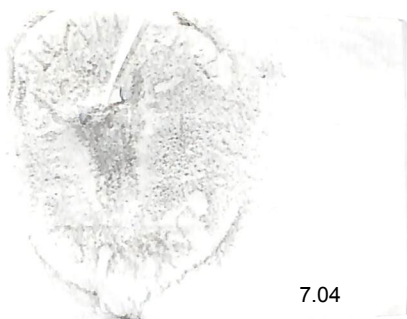

I hope you weren't adversely affected by the flood in Athens.

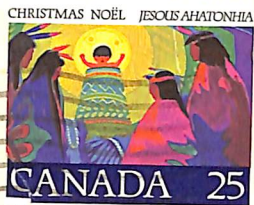
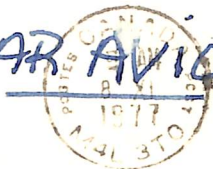

Dear Miss Maltby,

I am enclosing some small soft papers (actually cigarette papers) for you to try some pore rubbings of your Rhodian handle from Monte Smith. Use only one at a time. Press it onto the stamp closely, making sure that it does not move, either then or after you start rubbing the ^{on} graphite (powdered pencil shavings). Otherwise you get a blurred effect. I use my thumb to press, and index finger for rubbing on the black powder. Send us several attempts, and we will see what we can do.

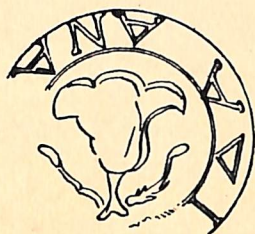
