Dear Mrs Brown,

T have been helping Miss Grace with the prepartaion of the corpus of Koan stamped amphora handles, and she has asked me to write to you about the possibility of obtaining photographs for this publication of one of the handles in the Ashmolean collection.

The handle is no. 1896 - 1908 G 531 (no. ASH 29 in our list of readings of 1961), and we wonder if it may be a nondouble handle of a type which also appears on the usual double-barrelled Koan handles. It would be good to have a photograph of the stamp (printed to the same actual size as the stamp) and, if possible, a photograph of the profile of the handle if the fragment is large enough to give any indication of the curve of the handle or its attachment to the neck of the jar.

You mentioned in your letter of May 9, 1978, that it might be possible to send photographs of all the ones in the collection which are new to Miss Grace's files, or better examples of types previously known, and she would still be very pleased to have these if it can be managed.

Hector Catling tells me that I should consult you en permission to mention in a publication one of the stamped handles in the collection of the Ashmolean. The handle is your 1888.199, from Naucratis. The stamp has an abbreviation T A , and above these letters the head of a lion or of a lion's skin; the device is incompletely impressed in your example, but clear in a second impression of the same die on another handle from Naucratis, British Museum 1955, 9-20, 70. The two handles are apparently from Samian ampheras (perhaps from the same stamp, and both pieces are from Naucratis); the date is prebably late 4th century B.C. I would like to mention your handle in an article for a memorial volume for Perphyrics Dikaies; the article identifies ampheras and stamps of Kourion in Cyprus; there seems to have been a connection with Sames. I would be grateful if you can give me permission to make this mention.

Looking up our records of stamps at the Ashmolean, ix I see that I have never sent you copies of our readings of your stamps, made from the rubbings you kindly made for me, was it in 1961. So I enclose here your copy, and hope they may be useful for your records. Where these copies are marked "NEW" or "PH" your stamps are of types new to our files, or are superior examples, and in either case phytographs would be very welcome for our archives here. If pessible, photographed without tipping, and the stamps should be printed at actual size, and the whole handle should show, especially for stamps whose class we have not recognized. I am perticularly in need of help for 1948.310: we have classed it as (early) Phodian, but I have doubts. In case someone would like to publish your stamps, I suggest getting up the subject in EAD (Deles) 27, pp. 277-382 and being sure to correct 3rd century dates by Ath, Witth. 1974, pp.193-200. Fublish with photographe. It is very nice to have the Catlings here. I much enjoyed being included in an informal but very pleasant dinner party for John Cook and for his new wife whom I had not met.

Dear Mr. Catling,

I was very sorry to miss you during my call at the Ashmolean on December 12, although I was taken care of very nicely by Anne Brown and John Boardman. Peter Megaw had told me about your book, now in press, on trade in copper and bronze during the Bronze Age (if I have it straight). I have now written to George Bass in Pennsylvania to tell him about it.

According to an amiable arrangement by your associates that day, Anne is going to make rubbings for me of the handles in the Ashmolean, since there a seem to be only about 65, and not the thousands that somebody had led me to expect. I should also be very grateful for photographs of the two Rhodian jars purchased by John. These should interpretables show the jars in as true a profile as possible, and be printed so that they are at one tenth actual size, and I'd like if convenient to have two prints of each. (We get such scale prints here, by giving the photographer small cardboard measures cut to just one/tenth of the height of the jar, and he lays them on the ground glass and screws to the right point. I would send you such measures but have no record of the heights of these jars.) Your jars are important, as we have no information of any other whole jar of Theymmastos, and no photograph of any of Andrikos, though one does or did exist (in Sicily).

Best wishes for Christmas and the New Year to you and your family. I hope 1961 with bring you to Greece.


