
Dear Reynold,

Dear Reynold,

Thank you for the drawing of the interesting stamped amphora. Have you had it for long? Are there others that I have not seen? I would love to have photographs, stamps as well as jar profiles. This one has a stamp we seem not to have on file at all, and I'd like to have a couple more rubbings, and enclose some papers which are specially good for this purpose. (That chap your "messenger" made that helped me, who was really a painter, took all my last lot - have you still got him?) You get best results by using a finger smeared with graphite rather than the pencil direct.) Does the stamp really say IIII? Is it completely preserved? I think the jar may be of the late 4th century, and is not Chian (at no period did they have rims like that) but I cannot really place it. It seems to resemble some jars in the apothekes of the Rhodes museum which I had very tentatively sorted out as possible ancestors of Hellenistic stamped Koan. Where was it found? Do send photos. Can you tell how the toe was?

Do try to come and see us on May 10, I have written you down in my calendar. I envy the visitors whom you are taking to Brauron, you must be one of the world authorities.

I will maybe come to London in the autumn, as I have a nephew there. He has finished Harvard Law School, and his military stint, and has been in a good Boston law firm, but thought he would like to broaden himself, so now he is working for Crane and Hawkins, 213 Norfolk(?) 



Beginning on May 21, 1962<sup>th</sup>, duplicates were  
made from the publication by AD supplemented by ME  
for non-Platonian problems, etc. They corrected wrong  
readings as far as possible without seeing rubbings or  
plots or of course the handles.

In June, 1962, AD made a list of items  
of which rubbings were wanted, either because they  
were new types or because they presented problems.  
<sup>Added</sup> This list was worn items listed by ME on 29.III.60, for  
rubbings and for notes on fabric. Note that by no means  
everything was rubbed, so most items have not been checked.

In July and in September, 1962, I made  
the rubbings and notes in the British Museum, so far as  
the handles were in place.

Beginning, at least, in Sept. 1962, AD  
examined rubbings and made indicated corrections  
in duplicates supplements again by AETT, who then she  
also added them on felt and replaced  
The original<sup>s</sup> were at sometime separated from  
the carbons; perhaps I took them to the B.M.

Now we need to separate fluting and cord types,  
post rubbing, and cut and not bark types.

Dear Maria,

It seems a very long time has gone by since I last wrote to you, and too long not to have written to you before, but the days have seemed very full, one way or another.

First I want to update myings taken in the British Museum. There is one Roman, 1925, 1-19, 799, from a group of 30 or 40 handles on a shelf in a reservoir, handles which I had not seen before, because they had been removed from a "Greek and Roman Life" exhibition, but not returned to the other handles. I have not recorded the rest of these handles as yet. There are 33 of the handles listed from 19 XII, 1 as needing myings, all I managed to get done the day I worked in the museum are 1066, 3-1102, 1, with gaps, see below. Most of the actual myings were taken by a guard they gave me, while I spent my time finding the handles and putting them away again. 

So all those, there at that time, got included and got <sup>numerical</sup> their numbers. There would be ~~definite~~ gaps, since part of an alphab. sequence. The rest should be part of what we saw in Rhodes?





2) We have made a revised set of readings of the stamps in IG XII, 1 (Hiller, 1895, with C. Aemilia Hutton virgo). These are from stamped handles from Rhodes mostly in your Museum. A few of these handles were recorded by me in 1955. For quite a lot more it has been possible to make very probable emendations of the published texts, without looking at the handles (though of course another look should be taken some day), because we have now a very rich file of Rhodian types. There is a copy for the Museum of the new set of readings with emendations, if you would like to put it in the Stamps dossier. But before we take apart the duplicates, there are about fifty items of which we would like rubbings, to enable us to make a control. This is a job of about two-three hours. Perhaps I could get Miss Arthur to do it, if Mr. Haynes will give permission. Or do you know of a student who would like the job? I would pay whatever is usual.


