an order for prints of 20.XI.46, the Metropolitan phot. dep't sent me partial reductions of 5041 and 5049 profiles, but not down to 1:10 as requested; I think it is very hard to reduce these photographs. These reductions have been reproduced also on Roll 659 (respectively 659.10A and 659.14A). I think they have been printed, but the prints have been mislaid. I fear that they will not be terribly sharp, after this double reproduction. We had never received a reduction of the large-scale photograph of 5065 (received in 1957), and cannot reproduce it in this office.

All this in connection with a call yesterday by Andrew Oliver of the Metropolitan. I showed him his letter to me of of 3.XI.63, and asked him if he recalled writing it.

(It had seemed to me quite monstrous, expecting a scholar to pay \$45 or more - sec. st.for photographs of each of their amphoras; also I had never been asked for such payment
before from the Met. - even as recently as 1961, when Dietrich sent me some photos, thus

Dear Mr. Oliver:

It was nice of you to remember my concern with your Cesnola Rhodian amphoras.

For comparative purposes in study and especially for publication, I need photographs of amphoras at 1/10 and of stamps at actual size, both as exactly as possible. That is, if the height of the amphora is actually 0.08 0.80 m. then in the picture it must be 0.08 m. (and not 0.09 m.). Of all three of your amphoras, I have very good photographs of the jars themselves, but all oversize. In the case of 74.51.357, my photo is at ca. 1/4. The other two have been reduced, but not enough. We can photograph your prints here and enlarge them to exact scale, but the result is not always quite as good. (The large pribts do have value in study of details.)

For prints of the stamps: I do have what appear to be exact-size prints of the three stamps on 74.51.5877. I do not have, but need, actual/-size prints of the stamps on 74.51.5876 and 74.51.357. The photo numbers on these seem to be 137102/83 g, 137103/83 g, 163739/858 g, 163740/858 g. I should be glad to have three prints each of these at actual size. This at your convenience.

I shall probably be leaving for three ormfour weeks' work in Alexandria on Nov. 5, so would not be able to make use of your photographs before December.

I have about six letters to write you, nearly all quite special.

- l) Thank you very much indeed for the offprint, received today. What a tremendous lot of careful and ingenious work went into this lucid communication! And what standards of professional handling the Netropolitan does maintain! Of this one is ready to be particularly aware after a little visit to another museum, of which more below. Dear Miss Alexander:

Thank you very much for your note giving the Beazley program. Are we artisans? At any rate, I do feel inclined not to miss any of the pearls.

I am also most grateful for help the other day. I feel that you gave me a great deal of your time, as well as some very helpful animadversions on methods of potting (expression used in English publications which always suggests to me the handling of a baby).

I find I have records of two Mhodian jars remaining with you from the Cesnola collection:

- 1) I.H.Hall, in Journal of the American Oriental Society XI, 1885. p. 391. no. 5041, which seems to have been marked with a number 17 in the Metropolitan. This is a jar marked with rose stamps of Hippokrates. in the term of Kenophantos (about 175 BC), the month Artamitios (April-May, I believe).
- 2) Ibid., p. 394, no.5049, marked 18 in the Metropolitan. Jar marked with rectangular stamps of Philainios, in the term of Philadamos (soon after 200 BC), and the month Agrianios (probably May-June).

I don't know how to identify them any better in your local records. In the sales catalogue of March 1928, similar jars were described as "Roman pottery amphorae from Cyprus". The article of Hall was reprinted in Cesnola, A Descriptive Atlas of the Cesnola Collection III: Supplement, Greek Inscriptions n.72-100. It seems to me possible you may have more than the two I find in my records; if so, I should be very glad to hear of them. I enclose a photograph of (2). Its height is .305.

It occurred to me that I might well examine these jars, measure capacity, etc., during the period Oct.1-10. I feel fairly sure, of course, that I shall want to check on them again later. Don't you really think they are proper material for exhibition? I venture to make the suggestion now because in walking through the galleries the other day I noticed what appeared to be indications of rearrangement. Or perhaps they might at least be made informally available for study in one of the downstairs cases. If this does not fit in with your

plans either, perhaps the Museum would consider letting them out, say on something like a permanent loan to the Princeton University Museum. Here they could be consulted in connection with my files, which I think may remain here eventually. Or you might just give them to me.

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
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
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


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
