This Nikasagoras is provisionally dated ca. 185 BC in Grace 1985, p. 9. Your no. 19 is apparently from an amphora of MAPEYAE, cf. the eponym stamp with delios head to left on the amphora published Empereur 1986, pp. 516-517, no.2. Dating stamps like your 19 a Helios head (stamps that name an eponym) that have any status to the left are magazatxan used at an earlier period by the fabricant AFOPANAE (see Grace 1979-2. fig. 25) whose suggested dates are ca. 221-199 BC, see Grace 1974. p. 200. Apparently we have to do with a continuing shop, as noted also by Empereur (loc.cit.) There are indications of earlier and later later activity also. This is a clear impression of a name known to us on under a dozen handles, found in Alexandria (most), Samaria, the Athenian Agora (1), and Rhodes (a handle now in the British Museum, published I.G. XII, 1, 1380), and on a whole amphora dated in the term of APMOΣΙΛΑΣ, reported from Telos: IG XII, 3, 83; cf. Rev.Arch. 32, 1876, p.295, which refers to a Smyrna newspaper, The Proodos of April 21, 1876. In the latter itxix it is stated that the jar of ΠΡΟΘΥΜΟΣ dated in the term of APMOΣΙΛΑΣ was kept by the publisher, the collector Δ. Xmbimpan XABIAPAΣ in his house. It may be the Rhodian amphora visible under the table in front of the collector in Xmapaximx Grace 1971, pl.15, no.15. We did not find find this amphora when we visited the Haviaras house in Symer in July, 1957

The amphora from Telos thus gives us a fairly fixed point in the activity of the fabricant ΠΡΟΘΥΜΟΣ: its dating name, ΑΡΜΟΣΙΛΑΣ, is πλουπχός shown by name-connections to be close to that of ΑΡΙΣΤΩΝΙΔΑΣ, now tentatively dated ca/ 222 BC, cf. Grace 1974, p.199.

Date soon after 240 B.C.: cf. Grace 1986, p.564, under no. 23.

For a whole jar (of IEPOTEAHZ) dated in his term, see <u>Hesperia</u>

XXII, 1953, pl.42, I, Ia and Ib; the latter are the characteristic

"button" stamps of IEPOTEAHZ. This jar is CMC 190 in the Cyprus Museum,

cf. <u>ibid</u>. p.119, note 10 for its measurements. It is dated (ibid., p.119, end of text) much too early. (Third century chronology needed revision, and not only that of the stamps.) CMC 190 has been republished (but without illustration), see Empereur 1986, p. 516, no.1, where the corrected date is given (following Grace 1974).

23 (77.275) 11POΘΥΜΟΣ, fabricant

This is a clear impression of a name known to us on under a dozen handles, found in Alexandria (most), Samaria, the Athenian Agora (1), and Rhodes (a handle now in the British Museum, published I.G. XII, 1, 1380), and on a whole amphora dated in the term of APMOΣΙΛΑΣ, reported from Telos: IG XII, 3, 83; cf. Rev.Arch. 32, 1876, p.295, which refers to a Smyrna newspaper, The Proodos of April 21, 1876. In the latter itxis it is stated that the jar of ΠΡΟΘΥΜΟΣ dated in the term of APMΟΣΙΛΑΣ was kept by the publisher, the collector Δ. Χπρίπρης ΧΑΒΙΑΡΑΣ in his house. It may be the Rhodian amphora visible under the table in front of the collector in Υπριστίπα Grace 1971, pl.15, no.15. We did not find this amphora when we visited the Haviaras house in Symer in July, 1957 1955, as reported in Grace 1971, p.54.

The amphora from Telos thus gives us a fairly fixed point in the activity of the fabricant NPOGYMOE: its dating name, APMOZIAAZ, is minuments shown by name-connections to be close to that of APIZTQNIAAZ, now tentatively dated ca/ 222 BC, cf. Grace 1974, p.199.

24 (68.279) ΣΑΡΑΠΙΩΝ, fabricant, with asterisks

This fabricant is dated in the first quarter of the 2nd century

BC by context as well as by name-connections: Agora EEXE SS 7899

with his name comes from cistern N 20: 7 dated "lst and early 2nd quarter" of the 2nd century B.C. in Agora XXII, p. 105. (The Emphoraxeta amphora stamps are of various geographical classes but unusually consistent in date and apparently do not go below the 1st quarter.)

On name connections of this fabricant, see Grace 1985, p.10. The top of an amphora endorsed by him (found in Cyprus) with both stamps preserved is dated by the eponym AOANOAOTOE, tentatively placed ca. 183 B.C., see ibid. pp. 9 and 10.

ANAEATOPAE, ep.

Reading: LE JII

LE JIII ANALEA

[K]INOIOY device?

The reading is filled out from an impression from the same die in the Benaki Collection in Alexandria, now in the Musée Gréco-Romain there. The Alexandria example (the only other one we know) is also incompletely impressed, and the Missouri example slightly corrects the reading we had on file.

The eponym dates in Period VI, ca 108-88 B.C. (see Grace 1985, p.42). See mention of him, Grace-Petropoulakou 1970, p.315, commentary DR on E 41.

ΔΑΜΟΚΡΑΤΗΣ, fabricant in circular stamp with rose

On the fabricant, and his predecessors and successors, see Grace 1985, pp. 8-19, 12-13, 45. Perhaps one of the his latest amphoras is shown ibid. pl. 1, 2, estimated date ca. 185 B.C. Known pairs bring the start of his career back to ca. 212 B.C.

Note that all these handles are Rhodian.
