Dear M. Masson,

Thank you for a copy of your review in Gnomon of Fraser's Lexicon of Personal Names, its first volume.

I imagine we both are aware of the complications of producing a publication of this kind. However, ^{Fraser} ~~he~~ insisted on having my material, published or not. I gave him my working lists of the names known to appear in stamps on Rhodian handles. The names were numbered to facilitate sorting the thousands of stamped handles in storerooms in Alexandria. Mr. Fraser is not an archaeologist, and did not understand that an inventory number identifies an object, not a name. Many of the names in my lists (of eponyms, and of fabricants) ~~may~~ ^{may} be not on any handles found at the Agora, since we find few of the later Rhodian that are so numerous in Alexandria. For your own use, then, wherever ^{in this volume} a Rhodian name appears with "Agora inv." and a number, the number is just that of a name, not of an Agora find.

Les hellénistes de diverses spécialités attendaient depuis longtemps un ouvrage qui viendrait enfin remplacer le vieux Wörterbuch der griech. Eigennamen de W. Pape et G. E. Benseler (PB), dont la mise en œuvre date des années 1863-1870.¹ Vers 1973, l'épigraphiste et historien d'Oxford Peter M. Fraser eut le courage de lancer une telle entreprise, qui serait cependant limitée aux seuls anthroponymes (ici: a.) attestés historiquement, les noms divins ou mythologiques d'une part, tous les toponymes, oronymes, hydronymes, etc., d'autre part, étant laissés de côté.² On comprend ces restrictions, vu l'énormité de la tâche, bien qu'elles soient en théorie bien regrettables pour les utilisateurs – et qu'elles maintiennent le recours au vieux PB pour de nombreuses décennies.

F. explique dans son introduction (VII-XXI) comment l'entreprise, conçue d'abord sur un plan alphabétique, suivant la tradition des dictionnaires, fut modifiée en cours de route pour laisser la place à une série de volumes régionaux. Ainsi le vol. I annoncé ici contient, d'une façon certes arbitraire, les îles de l'Égée, avec Chypre, et la Cyrénaïque. Le vol. II doit renfermer l'Attique, le vol. III le Péloponnèse et une grande partie de la Grèce propre, et ainsi de suite (VII). Ce parti pouvait assurément être discuté, les deux procédés ayant leurs avantages et leurs inconvénients. Suivant le classement alphabétique global, un volume pour la lettre A contenant le domaine entier aurait été certainement très long à réaliser, avec le risque de demeurer longtemps unique, comme le prouvent d'autres expériences. Finalement, un volume régional comme celui-ci a l'avantage, sous un format maniable, de former un ensemble assez cohérent. Grâce à l'abondance de la documentation onomastique qui est fournie par les grandes îles, la Crète, l'Eubée, Kos, Rhodes, Chios, Samos, Thasos, on obtient une bonne idée de l'anthroponymie grecque dans son ensemble, avec des secteurs doriens et ioniens, aussi une partie éolienne. Dans de nombreux cas, on a déjà des indications utiles sur la fréquence, la localisation et la chronologie d'un a. grec: voir ainsi les entrées Ἀπολλώνιος, Δημήτριος, etc.

C'est grâce à l'utilisation systématique des ordinateurs que F. et sa principale collaboratrice Mme Matthews, assistés par plusieurs spécialistes, ont pu faire paraître ce vol. I. Il renferme une documentation énorme, qui est disposée sur trois colonnes, dans une impression très lisible. Étant donné que chaque attestation d'un nom est numérotée (chiffres gras), on trouve ici une énumération géographique, dans l'ordre alphabétique des sites (par exemple d'Amorgos à Théra), et chronologique, autant que faire se peut, pour chaque site. Ainsi, depuis les hapax (très nombreux et sur lesquels on reviendra), on arrive aux champions de la fréquence déjà cités, tels Ἀπολλώνιος (532 nos) ou Δημήτριος (426 nos), etc.

Cette présentation est effectivement très commode et riche d'enseignements de toute sorte. Elle montre en même temps le nombre et la richesse des sources utilisées (bibliographie en xxii-xxxiv). Tous les recueils épigraphiques existants, comme il est naturel, le SEG, parfois le CIG quand c'est nécessaire, des ouvrages spécialisés, des articles de revue, la plupart des œuvres de L. Robert, et pour les monnaies (noms des magistrats monétaires) une quantité impressionnante de recueils et catalogues (on y reviendra). Les textes des auteurs classiques ont naturellement été utilisés pour les ressortissants des régions considérées, textes littéraires, historiens des FGrH, philosophes de Diels-Kranz, etc.

Dans certains cas, les attributions régionales peuvent demeurer nécessairement hypothétiques, ainsi pour Héro(n)das utilisé à l'occasion pour Kos, avec ou sans interrogation (s. vv. Βάρταρος, Μύρτης, etc.); le nom du poète encore sous Ἡρωίδας (4), à tort selon moi). Pour les personnages historiques, on a renvoyé systématiquement à la RE, ce qui est un procédé économique: ainsi Homère a une brève entrée: «Chios? (1) ?VIII-VII BC RE...», beaucoup de choses étant dites en peu de mots ou sigles.

Dans l'utilisation de ces innombrables sources, les spécialistes de tel ou tel domaine trouveront assurément des lacunes, ce qui ne pouvait être évité (voir des exemples plus loin). En sens inverse, on pourrait se plaindre d'une sorte d'excès de zèle, lequel a conduit à une chasse aux exemples nouveaux qui est susceptible d'être dangereuse. Je crois qu'un recueil de grande consultation, destiné à demeurer longtemps en usage, se doit d'être extrêmement sélectif et prudent. Or, en regardant de près, on constate, surtout pour des hapax, le recours excessif à des sources quasi impossibles à contrôler: journal quotidien (Bêma, biblio. xxiv), volumes rarissimes (Peristianis, xxi), catalogues numismatiques consultables seulement dans les plus grands cabinets (voir la biblio passim, environ soixante-dix titres!). Mieux encore, d'assez nombreuses références renvoient à des inédits. Le souci est louable, mais comment contrôler, les formes en question étant souvent isolées, voire inquiétantes? Ainsi en ce qui concerne des a. sur des anses d'amphores, des renvois à 'Ag. Inv.' (= Agora Inventory, pour Athènes), tantôt avec no. d'inventaire, tantôt même sans no. De même, pour des inédits, souvent dans des musées locaux: que fera-t-on avec «Βάσων Chios (1) f. IV BC Unp. (Chios Mus., sherd)»? Les renvois à des monnaies inédites sont de la même espèce.³ Finalement, la liste des références pour des inédits divers occupe vingt lignes de la bibliographie (xxxiv). Cette richesse a contribué notablement à l'augmentation du nombre des hapax, ce qui est toujours dangereux (comme le montreront plus loin des exemples pour cette catégorie).

Un autre parti-pris plus ou moins contestable à mon sens est le renvoi constant et unique à des encyclopédies et surtout à diverses prosopographies. Les renvois à la RE pour les personnages historiques sont admissibles; cependant il n'aurait pas pris beaucoup de place de donner d'abord une référence de base, par exemple 'Hdt. . . = RE. . .' (pour les textes, la consultation du vieux PB fait toujours gagner du temps). Mais pour les contemporains d'Alexandre, devrait-on se reporter à la prosopographie de Berve, qui n'est pas toujours d'un accès facile dans les bibliothèques? Pour les papyrus d'époque hellénistique, la PP ou Prosopographia Ptolemaica est certes

très recommandable; mais pour des personnages chypriotes, la PPC ou Prosopography of Ptolemaic Cyprus de Mme Nicolaou sera de consultation moins aisée. En conclusion sur ce point, je crois donc que des références d'un type plus traditionnel auraient profité aux utilisateurs.

L'adoption de l'ordre alphabétique, évidente pour un lexique ou un dictionnaire, ne semble pas poser de problème a priori. En regardant ce volume, on s'aperçoit cependant qu'il y a des nuances. Dans un recueil traditionnel, cet ordre n'est pas servile, il est relatif.

Ainsi le PB s. v. Θεόδωρος dira in fine 'S. Θεόδωρος' (ajoutons: 'ἠδ Θεόδωρος'), s. v. Θεόδωρος il y a 'Θεόδωρος', et ainsi de suite comme dans les répertoires du lexique. Ici, comme on l'a vite remarqué, l'ordre alphabétique est non seulement le souverain absolu, mais encore est-il dépourvu de toute espèce de renvoi interne.

De cette manière, l'helléniste qui veut se renseigner sur un a. grec et ses variantes dialectales éventuelles devra s'y retrouver tout seul, avec des formes apparaissant dans l'ordre strict de l'alphabet, sans élément de comparaison. C'est ce qui est annoncé (xii): «All true dialect-forms are entered separately from the Attic or koine forms». J'aurais donc préféré, soit le regroupement harmonieux de toutes les formes connues d'un même a., à partir de la forme usuelle: Θεόδωρος, avec Θεόδωρος, Θεόδωρος, parfois Θεόδωρος (manque dans ce volume); soit le maintien d'une série d'entrées correspondantes, mais assorti d'un système très régulier de renvois internes.

Ces premiers exemples sont simples. Il en va de même pour des variantes dialectales telles que -ίδας/-ίδης: en suivant l'ordre, Θεοδωρίδας apparaîtra avant Θεοδωρίδης, et ainsi de suite. De même pour des variantes phonétiques claires, comme Ζώσαριν et Ζωσάριον qui se suivent, Μάριν et Μάριον proches. Mais il existe des situations bien plus complexes, en fonction des formes parfois très différenciées que peut prendre un même a. grec.

Examinons le cas des noms qui à l'origine comportaient un w ou digamma. Plusieurs partis ont d'ailleurs été adoptés ici. On s'étonne d'abord de constater qu'à sa place alphabétique, après epsilon, la rubrique avec F initial se borne à quatre entrées seulement (192). Le premier, un Φαναξαγόρας de Crète, aurait d'ailleurs dû figurer plus haut sous Ἀναξαγόρας (35 sq.), car tel est le parti le plus fréquent dans ce cas: la forme avec F est placée parmi celles qui en sont dépourvues, ainsi pour Chypre le premier de l'entrée: «Ἀναξαγόρας Cyprus (1) ... (Fav-») (mention finale), ce qui est en somme une infraction au strict alphabétisme, avec séparation de formes identiques (Chypre et Crète). De même un Φάστων crétois est disjoint des Ἄστων d'Eubée, le Φικαδίων crétois d'autres Ἰκαδίων crétois, etc. A part également reste le Βικαδίων crétois, avec la notation fréquente du w par un bêta, qui n'a pas échappé à sa place alphabétique (101).

Bien d'autres formes sont dissociées. Pour les voyelles, un autre facteur important de dispersion est naturellement le flottement entre un alpha long conservé et le traitement par êta. On songe aussitôt au radical important Ἄγησ(ι)-, si répandu en domaine dorien (Crète, Kos, Rhodes) et à son équivalent Ἥγησ(ι)- en domaine ionien, ici avec un facteur supplémentaire de complication, le rhotacisme érétien, comme Ἥγησανδρος, etc. La même variation, mais à l'intérieur, va semblablement séparer une série Ὀνάσ(ι)- d'une autre Ὀνησ(ι)-, plus l'érétien Ὀνήσανδρος, Ὀνήριμος, etc.

Tous ces cas ne sont pas vraiment difficiles. Pour les initiales, il peut y avoir d'autres complications. Soit pour les composés en Λᾶο-, ici peu nombreux sous cette forme, qui peuvent figurer sous Λα-, Λᾶναξ (Crète), Λεα-, Λεᾶναξ (Samos,

Thasos, ici mal accentué), Λεω-, Λεῶναξ (Chios, Rhodes), enfin Λη-, Λῆναξ (Délôs), etc. Souvent une forme dialectale isolée est difficile à définir sans une analyse précise.

Ainsi pour 'Λυκίδεος', monétaire à Chios (hapax, 290). L'accent semblerait correct, mais quel suffixe? En réalité, il faut écrire Λυκιδεός, où -εο- est une variante ionienne de -ευ- (cf. à l'initiale Εὐ- pour Εὐ-); finalement, c'est un avatar de Λυκιδεύς absent par hasard de ce volume (voir Bechtel, HPN 584, Priène). Faut-il s'inquiéter d'un Καρισθένης crétois et le corriger éventuellement en Καρ(τ)ι- (251)? Non, c'est la variante non aspirée de Χαρι- (482), prévisible en Crète; de même Καρμάνωρ 252) vaut Χαρμ-.

On pourrait ainsi multiplier les exemples de ce phénomène de dissociation, gênant pour l'usager: il aurait pu être évité grâce à une analyse 'grammaticale' (ordinairement, mais pas toujours fournie par les sources), et il faut souhaiter que les éditeurs y prennent garde pour les futurs volumes où la bigarrure dialectale se manifestera de nouveau.

Un autre problème important pour un dictionnaire d'usage est celui des hapax, auquel j'ai déjà fait des allusions, et qui demeure plus important qu'il ne pourrait sembler au lecteur pressé. Par définition un a. hapax est un *hapax legomenon*, mais au contraire de ce qui arrive chez les auteurs, cette unicité est ordinairement due au seul hasard des documents. Ainsi un hapax ou *testis unus* peut devenir *testis nullus* si l'on s'aperçoit, comme il arrive, qu'il repose sur une erreur et doit disparaître. En revanche, ce qui arrive aussi, l'apparition d'un deuxième témoignage peut en faire un *dis legomenon*, dont le statut est alors bien supérieur, puisqu'il reçoit confirmation et comme lettre de noblesse (voir à ce sujet les intéressantes listes de fréquence données par H. Solin au tome III des Griech. PN in Rom, avec des listes abondantes de *tris* et *dis legomena*, suivies de listes d'hapax encore plus longues). On prendra d'ailleurs garde, à ce sujet, que les hapax du vol. I, où ne figurent que certaines régions, ne sont pas nécessairement uniques dans tout le domaine de l'anthroponymie, mais pour le moment, seule une recherche spéciale peut l'indiquer.

Quelques exemples à titre indicatif: *Αγαυος (5, Rhodes) existe ailleurs, HPN 562; *Αζα-ορατος (15, Délôs) en diverses régions, selon moi bithynien et non grec (Mélanges Mihailov, traine, 1972, 119-122), etc.

Il faut dire aussi que certains hapax, tout à fait irréprochables, ne sont que des variantes dialectales d'un nom qui figure déjà ici sous sa forme courante (ce qui n'est jamais indiqué), soit dans d'autres régions. Voir déjà ci-dessus ce qui a été dit pour Καρισθένης, Λυκιδεός.

Ajouter d'autres formes plus ou moins délicates à identifier, comme *Ορτιος (354, Samos), pour *Εόρτιος; d'autres formes crétoises, telles *Ανταύκης qui vaut -άλκης en Crète (43; εν τας archaïque, inédit (370) doit valoir Πέρ(α)ν)τας (372, cf. BCH 1985, 193 sq.); Ουχάσις (228) pour Τυχάσιος et -ις (cf. ibid. 193), etc.

Mais, ce qui est plus grave, il y a des hapax dangereux, erronés en partie ou totalement, dont le dépistage n'est pas toujours facile. J'avais évoqué naguère les dangers divers que présentent certains hapax en pensant au vieux PB, qui était excusable pour son époque d'enregistrer (mais parfois avec des?) des hapax plus ou moins erronés, et surtout à cause du dictionnaire inverse de Dornseiff-Hansen

(1957), qui n'en avait jamais fait la critique et les remettait en circulation.⁴ Il apparaît aujourd'hui qu'une nouvelle mise en garde est nécessaire: le statut de chaque hapax, avant son enregistrement définitif, devrait obligatoirement être contrôlé, alors même qu'il s'agit de très nombreuses entrées, et que l'aspect de ces noms est souvent inoffensif. On s'en aperçoit assez facilement, en notant à chaque page les a. m(asculins) ou f(éminins) pourvus d'une attestation unique. A leur sujet, on ne saurait formuler de recette générale, car chacun peut être un cas particulier. On peut cependant dégager des catégories.

La plus vite reconnaissable est celle des simples lapsus du catalogue, ordinairement pour une lettre, cas heureusement assez rares. Ainsi un 'Πνυθαγόρας' (374, avec théta) doit s'écrire avec un tau et rejoindre l'entrée suivante; un 'Μεισικράτης' non plausible (302, Délôs) est un Πεισικράτης; un 'Αγοθόλας' crétois (13) est un 'Αγαθόλας.

Une autre série assez riche est celle des 'faux nominatifs', qui sont déjà représentés chez PB, par exemple 'Αρηνος', doublement fautif, pour 'Αρήν, génitif 'Αρήνος sur des monnaies de Dyrhachion, et cas similaires. Or, dans le nouveau recueil, on retrouve parfois le même accident. Douterait-on de l'hapax 'Μολέσιος' (319) inédit de l'Agora (voir plus haut)? Vérification faite, il s'agit du génitif d'un nom asianique, surtout lycien Μολεσις (L. Zgusta, Kleinasiat. PN § 946-7), dont la présence n'étonnera pas sur une anse d'amphore rhodienne. Autre exemple avec 'Πυθῶς' (395, Chios). Il existe bien des noms en -ως, mais peu nombreux et localisés, tels Δάμωος à Chypre (119), etc. Ici, le recours à l'index de la source citée, SEG XIX, 580, aurait montré qu'on est parti du génitif Πυθῶ: celui-ci doit être rattaché à un nominatif Πυθῆς (tout comme Βιτῶ et 'Απελλῶ dans le texte comparable XIX, 578). C'est donc un autre exemple de Πυθῆς, déjà enregistré à sa place pour Chios et Samos, forme ionienne de Πυθέας, présentant, comme souvent ces noms contractes, plusieurs formes de génitif.⁵

On rencontre aussi des hapax fautifs, dont la présence et la survie résultent simplement de lacunes dans la recherche bibliographique. Leur aspect parfois monstrueux ou inacceptable aurait pourtant dû attirer l'attention et la méfiance.

Un beau spécimen est donné par 'Βωχίκολτος' (sic) pour un Cyrénéen (105) dans un papyrus du III^e. Un tel a. est impossible: or, la consultation de l'Onomasticon de D. Foraboschi (1971), nécessaire pour une référence papyrologique (mais l'ouvrage manque ici dans la bibliographie) montre que c'est une lecture fautive, pour un inoffensif Καλλικράτης(!); ajoutons que J. Bingen, ChrEg 46 (1971) 398 avait déjà rappelé l'erreur. Curieusement, certains fantômes avaient été exorcisés depuis longtemps par L. Robert. C'est le cas pour 'Αἴγυπτοῦχα' (sic) en Crète (18), élucidé naguère dans Etudes Epigr. et philol. 190 (retrouvant un Αἴγυπτος); le beau composé crétois 'Οικόστυλος' (347) est à couper autrement, un OMS IV, 219 reprenant BullEp 1963, 129 in fine. Un autre exemple assez instructif. Un hapax pour Samos serait 'Αγτιώναις?' (49; noter un? et des lettres pointées), avec une structure bien bizarre. Mais pour cette lecture de J. P. Barron pour un génitif sur une monnaie de Samos, Robert avait déjà fourni critique et solution, dans son livre Monnaies grecques, types, légendes, magistrats monétaires... (Paris, 1967, 28-29; cet ouvrage ne figure pas ici dans la bibliographie). Le nom en question, écrit en petites lettres, est le patronyme d'un monétaire, et il existe une variante avec un nom abrégé ANTIA à la même place; au lieu de la lecture aberrante de Barron, Robert propose un génitif 'Αντιάνακτος de l'a. déjà attesté 'Αντιάναξ (ici pour Délôs et Thasos). L'utilisation de l'ouvrage de Robert aurait permis d'améliorer d'autres lectures pour des noms de Samos, mais la place manque ici. Enfin, il faut signaler un véritable 'nid' d'hapax erronés attribués ici à 'Délôs?' en suivant la première

Den herkömmlich an Zettelkästen arbeitenden Lexikographen werden seit Jahren die Möglichkeiten der elektronischen Datenverarbeitung entgegengehalten, wobei nicht nur erhöhte Schnelligkeit, sondern auch größere Genauigkeit und Vollständigkeit, in der Lexikographie stets angestrebte Ziele, als Vorteile genannt werden. Daß allerdings dann, wenn mehr als eine alphabetisch geordnete Zusammenstellung der Formen angestrebt, also die Lemmatisierung erforderlich wird, es auch in der Computerlexikographie zu zahlreichen Fehlern kommen kann, demonstrieren die ersten fünf Bände der Hippokrateskonkordanz,¹ zu der jetzt ein Zusatzband mit zwei rückläufigen Indices erschienen ist. Der erste Index enthält auf 59 Seiten die Lemmata der Konkordanz nach dem Prinzip des bekannten rückläufigen Wörterbuchs von Kretschmer-Locker, jedoch ohne die Unterscheidung nach der Betonung. In dem zweiten Index folgen auf 423 Seiten (ebenfalls rückläufig) alle Wortformen, wie sie in den Perikopen der Konkordanz angegeben sind. Vorwort (S. III) und Einleitung (S. V) ersetzen wegen ihrer Knappheit nicht die Kenntnis von Paginierung und Einleitung der Konkordanz. Den Abschluß bildet außerhalb der elektronischen Datenverarbeitung erstellten Listen sind also die Datensammlungen der Konkordanz, deren Bearbeitung in den Bänden I–V zu erheblicher Kritik Anlaß gibt.² Die Frage, ob für Band VI Korrekturen erfolgt sind, da die erhobenen falsche, d. h. überflüssige, und 75 fehlende Lemmata) als auch unter verschiedenen Gesichtspunkten die Lemmatisierung betreffen,³ ist leider zu verneinen.

Aber (Feminina der a-Deklination, Buchen substantivierter Neutra von Adjektiven als Adjektive, Alphabet. Eine wenig hilfreiche Angabe sind im rückläufiger Ordnung eine starke Verschiebung im Zahlen, z. B. ἀκτὴ 2. Laut Einleitung des Bandes VI handelt es sich um einen Hinweis auf Homographen, an LSJ orientiert, teilweise auch an dem Lexikon von Bailly,⁵ vgl. die Einlei-

relating to Nikasion's date. Since a better reading of a stamp on an amphora from Cyprus (now in Sarasota, Florida, see Grace 1948: 146) shows that the eponym paired there with Nikasion is Aristodamos (not Eudamos or Sodamos as previously guessed), all eponyms that have been associated with Nikasion in known or reasonably guessed pairs (Agestratos 2nd, Athanodotos, Aristodamos 2nd, and Theaidetos) are now seen to date between about 184 and about 176 B.C. (Grace 1985: 8-9). This date is supported by the fact that three stamps of Nikasion were found in the Pergamon deposit (Schuchhardt 1895: nos. 1146, 1147, 1148), and none in the slightly earlier Middle Stoa construction filling in the Athenian Agora, of which the end date proves to be about 183 B.C. (Grace 1985: 24, summary on this end date, now, it seems, generally accepted; *ibid.*: 7-9 on relative dates of the Middle Stoa filling and of the Pergamon deposit, which is shown to be ^{letter} ~~is~~ ^{end} about seven years later. The one stamp of Nikasion from the Agora (SS 13761)¹⁰ was found just on top of ~~the~~ a part of the Middle Stoa filling.

Our vol III is moving ahead quite well; almost all computerized, and much of it edited. I wrote last autumn to Professor Koehler about Corinthian jars, but have had no reply.

I am going on a tour of Albania in April, since much of vol III is concerned with N. Epirus and Illyria, & I do not know the lie of the land, and without such knowledge I feel unable to make decisions. I hope I enjoy it!

Dear Peter,

I was glad of the opportunity to meet your co-author Mrs. Matthews during your visit to Athens in October. I hope you both had a good journey home.

I have had a look at the printout of Sinopean names. In the book, are you going to put asterisks on the fabricants? I see they are sometimes but not always (?) described as "potters". For dates: if you use what Brashinsky has given you, you should of course attribute them, and say quite specifically when he gave them to you; he made his own revisions. Refer also to Hesperia 1985, pp. 20-21, for my dates for this class, which end the whole series in 183, when Pharnaces took Sinope. There is a certain amount of further confirmation to support this proposal.

For the volume which is to include Knidian, what I asked to see was of course not the text at this stage, but a sample of what you propose to print, so as to prevent expressions like "Agora inventory no. ⁴R 34" (which did not appear in what I saw of the Rhodian before publication, but evolved later). I won't try to make individual comments on what you have sent me, since it needs lots of revision first by your co-workers against my Hesperia 1985 article. I mention several matters noticed in a quick look:

omission of eponym ΔΑΙΤΑΛΟΣ who appears in quantity in Pnyx and EAD 27 indexes Use our indexes, which are much better than what your young ladies will put together from looking at the articles. They not only show you what is in the article, but sort out the best items for your purpose.

duoviri are not identified (cf. ΒΑΚΧΙΟΣ). These officials are listed in Pnyx, as well as in Hesperia 1985. Are you counting them as potters? which certainly they are not.

Phrourarchs are not identified (cf. ΑΠΙΛΑΣΙΟΣ). On these, see EAD 27, pp.318-320. 4-month terms, sometimes named in stamps in addition to an annual eponym. Period IVA in list, Hesp.1985, pp. 32-34.

In checking their list against those pp. 32-34, the young ladies should discard a name such as ANAPOKAKHΣ, which was based on a guess made in 1934. And correct wrong spellings taken from out of date publications.

One more matter: I think you made some inquiry about "KT - can it be used?" As far as I understand the question, the answer is: not by you. A number preceded by ^{KT} identifies a Knidian stamp type, a particular minuscule reading, which may be known in more than one die and usually in a number of impressions. See EAD 27, p. 323, and cf Hesperia 1985, p.14 with note 28, - but enough was in EAD. In ^a ~~xxxx~~ KT (Knidian Type) reading there are usually at least two names, sometimes four, which names reappear in other combinations. If you use these letters, KT, in a way of your own, you will cause confusion, at least at first. As with "Agora Inventory Nos."

The various American Classical or Archeological Schools seem to be copying the British ones, and having meetings at their various bases. Our director, W. Coulson, is off soon to Nepal, of which the ASCS is new to me. It is hoped there will be an opportunity to see mountains.

Dear Peter,

Thank you for your letter of August 9. With regard to "Corcyrean" versus "Corinthian B", best to write to Carolyn Koehler. For some years she has been calling these jars products of Corinth; but recently, as I understand it, kilns containing such amphoras have been found in Corfu, so it seems some at least were made there.

For Greek stamps on amphoras made in the west, I do not have this well in hand, but cf. Hesperia 51, 1982, p.342, bottom paragraph (Will).

For ΙΗΗΟΚΡΑΤΗΣ, Rhodian fabricant, I don't see why you did not give the useful reference in Hesperia 1985. In this case, it was not necessary to reduce him to that imaginary Agora inventory number.

I did not, you know, agree to such an identification as, e.g., "Agora inventory number R 290" (for Hippocrates). Agora inventory numbers for fragments with stamps begin with SS. Others that may be made up do not lead to information, when your readers write to the Agora Excavations. You cannot decide, like Humpty Dumpty, what "Agora inventory number" means.

I thought it might be possible to avoid peculiarities in the text of your Knidian volume, if I could see a few pages of its proposed text (i.e. pages that cited names derived from stamps) before the text becomes camera-ready. I am sorry, I cannot undertake a general check of your Knidian names (no time). I suggest attention to my article in Hesperia 1985.

I look forward to seeing you in October.

Thank you for your letter, and for the enclosed xerox from Miss Kontorini (it joins a xerox of a letter of yours to her in my file, of 17 December, 1975). No: she has not written to me, and since the letter is not addressed to me, I shall not write to her.

Your own letter led me once again to examine our labyrinthine file of correspondence. I do not see that at any point I had assumed, or wished to create the assumption in other people, that all the items entered as "Ag.Inv." were Agora finds. The formula I expressed in my letter of 20 March 1978 regarding the use of "U.P.Ag." or "Ag.Inv.no." met with your general approval in your reply of 19 June 1978. You said: 'I think we shall have to stick to this (sc. formula)'. It was an attempt on both our parts to find a formula that would indicate that the material and the use of it lay with you, and, as I explained in the Introduction to the Volume, we used it in the form you had made available without significant alteration. It was a convenient way of indicating where critically sifted data could be found. The system was not ideal, but, as you said in your letter of 13 October 1980, postscript, 'The list (which you provided) is not ... for any kind of publication except that the individual entries may take their place in your lexicon. The work we here have put into it gives us the right to give it its first publication in a much more controlled and finished form than it now has'; cf. my corresponding reply of 15 November, para. 4.

I am indeed sorry if Miss Kontorini is confused, but she must be very simple if she thinks that the items referred to are stone-inscriptions, which, in any case, are in principle excluded, with a few exceptions, from the *Lexicon* (see *Introd.* p. viii). However, if you like to draft a corrigendum for the next volume I will gladly include it, though it will not, of course, appear for some time. The use of the term 'Study no.' is new to me, but I do not see any objection to its use for the future. You will understand, I am sure, that with camera-ready copy, corrections cannot be made in the body of the text itself. Therefore, whatever formula you devise will have to be used for future volumes only. I hope, as editor, that, if you decide on this course, it will not cause confusion to those who read corrigenda less carefully than they should.

With regard to future volumes, Vol. II is an onomastikon of Attika, on which I have not personally been engaged, but will (I take it) contain no amphora-stamps. Vol. III, which is now being edited here,

contains the material from the Peloponnese and Mainland Greece south of Macedonia (see Introd. to vol. I, p. vii). It should, therefore, include the names from amphora-handles from Corinth. I have not seen Miss Koehler's dissertation, but I have her address as given in your letter of 5 October 1977; in any case, if the work was printed, or published in a microfilm series, or in any other way, we can, no doubt, get hold of it.

It is good of you to offer to check our Knidian names. We have a large collection of them from you sent at different dates, from 1969 and from EAD, and a letter from you of 6 September 1978. We have not yet computerised this material, which will appear in Vol. V (cities of the Asia Minor coast), but we are now adopting a policy of computerising large blocks of material from this region, as opportunity arises, and we have done it already for, e.g. Ephesos and Miletus, and there is no reason why we should not tackle Knidos: we have a large epigraphical and numismatic file of Knidians. The summer, such as it is, is upon us, and, like everybody else, we are understaffed, and so it is perhaps not the best time to start a new, largish chunk of material, but we will see what we can do. It would probably be most helpful to you to have a complete file, from which you could make comparisons for homonyms etc., and we could mark the handles for ready reference. The material would be unedited, with two consequences (i) that we would greatly welcome any help you could give us in updating the handle part of it, and (ii) that it would have to be regarded as confidential, not because I personally have any proprietorial feeling about it, but because if I have not edited it, I am not prepared to guarantee the entry as the best possible.

In answer to your question why Theaidetos has a precise date and his fabricant a wider bracket, we gave Hippocrates a longer lease of life than the closely-dated eponym because you said in your article that Hippocrates's 'career can be followed to probably the middle of the second century, B.C.' and 'fiiB' seemed to correspond to that.

Why does it seem not to correspond?

I am now studying the epigraphical material from Magna Graecia, among other regions, pleasantly remote from Rhodes, Delos and Crete, but near enough to Epirus to feel at home. Have you stamps from Campania? Or Bruttium? Or Calabria? If so, we shall be glad to hear of them! Is the situation regarding possible Corcyrean handles other than it was when you wrote your note in *Hesperia*, 40, 1971, p. 74, note 56? (X)

I don't know why you should assume the persons listed by Miss Kondorini in her letter to you of June 17 are eponyms. In fact, they are drawn from our general list of Rhodian fabricants (with suggested dates) of which Fraser has a copy. It just happens that most of those she cites in her letter appear (with various dates) both in our R (fabricant) and RE (eponym) Rhodian study lists.

Not known at all as eponyms in stamps are the following from her list:

APIETOMBPOTOS, APIETOMHANE, and APIETONIKOS. They are fabricants only.

More interesting is the fact that the items in our R list have been interpreted by Fraser in the Lexicon Miss. K. refers to as Agora Inventory numbers. I heard a day or two ago from Michael Osborne that you were not only back in Athens and flourishing, but that you had also had a birthday celebration. Congratulations on both scores! I hope you are able to get about a certain amount now, at least to the Agora. Michael gave me what news there was from Athens - I hope to be able to come to the celebrations at the British School in the summer.

Our onomastikon is now in the Data-Base, and we hope to deliver it to the OUP for publication by the end of March. It has been a long time, but the setting up of this volume does not have to be repeated for subsequent ones. Michael Osborne's Attic volume, now far advanced, will probably be our Volume II, while Volume III, done wholly here, will comprise the Peloponnese + Northern + Western Greece as far as Thessaly. We envisage getting the Peloponnese-Boetia-Thessaly into the Data-Base by this autumn, so things are not going too badly.

I hope our amphora-names, particularly the Rhodian, are still OK, i.e. broadly speaking as you gave them to us before, with corrected dates in your later publications. 
I see from a note of Virginia's in EAD 27 that you also have a small file of Chian names. Since our Chian file is also otherwise complete it seems a pity to omit them.

Dear Virginia,

We have been trying to tidy up the onomastic file of Kos, which as given in S. Sherwin White's book is far complete (not in respect of handles, which is what I am really nitpicking about, but of names in texts and inscriptions). We now need, if possible, to decide finally on what names on handles should be omitted if any. I have an old list of yours of 40 Jan. 1958, with accompanying letter of 17 Feb. of that year. I have worked that list up at various times for parallels in the Kos material published since then. I see however from your letter of Nov. 10. 1979 (the letter is headed "Nov. 10. 1070", but the first paragraph refers to a letter of June of 25.X.79, so I suppose it is 1979!) that you would be prepared to let us have your Kos file as it now stands, and if this offer still stands we would certainly like to take advantage of it. It would be treated with the same confidentiality as all our other unpublished material, though, correspondingly, we would give all the refs. you wanted as we have done for Rhodes. You say this could be done with comparatively little trouble, and I would not ask you if I thought it would cause you as much work as the Rhodian did. It is also possible (since I think our loan onomastikon is effectively otherwise complete) that we might be able to add parallels, or (if you wanted it) send you a "print-out" of it.

Material for our vol I is, now, otherwise to hand, apart from a few coins, and there seems a good chance that we shall

get it to press this year. It will contain all the islands (except the Ionian Islands which come in vol. II) and Cyrenaica. It is by much a work of collaboration, at least for some parts, and this is a considerable relief since expert hands have been at work on difficult islands and areas.

I heard today, indirectly, that you may be coming to UK ^{for} the Christmas season. I am going to Philadelphia to conduct a homel-
long seminar on the Lexicon, on Boxing Day, so I may miss you, but I shall only be gone a very few days.

To revert to Kos, I should say that I shall not attempt to use the old list, as things at present stand, so please do not be worried on that account. ~~When~~

(I cannot check this entry, as she is away and I don't find the onomastikon).

2) In case your co-workers sometimes take names straight from an index, let me call attention to the entry ΘΕΡΣΑΝΑΡΟΣ ΑΡΙΣΤΟΚΛΕΥΣ, Dunant and Pouilloux, p.280: not only is he not an eponym of Rhodes but he is a non-person, as can be seen by referring to the text.

Miss Grace has asked me to write to you on her behalf about some of the points raised in your letter to her of 15 November, 1980.

In particular about the dating of Period I, she would not be surprised if there were stamped Rhodian amphoras as early as 325, but the most likely candidates (items from the Pipinoy Apothetes found with red figure kraters) are not in the list she gave you: they read $\text{A}\rho\epsilon$, or a monogram, or an abbreviation on pieces that are not at all surely Rhodian jars. (There are also some fragments of definitely non-Rhodian jars). So perhaps it would be better to say c. 310. as you suggest.

She also wonders where you have put the names of phrouarchoi from Knidian stamps; are they all matched in your Rhodian name list? In Peraea (p. 93 last line) you refer to them as "mercenary leaders rather than Rhodian citizens", and Miss Grace also thinks that they were not necessarily Rhodians. Many of these names do not occur in Rhodian stamps.

Summary Report, 1979/80

This Summary is intended to indicate the progress of the project, in the last year, while the accompanying two tables (Annexes A and B) tabulate the present stage of the regional onomastika individually. As indicated previously, we are pleased to offer information on individual regions that have been covered, but it will be appreciated that it is not possible to provide answers regarding the occurrence (or non-occurrence) of a name over the entire regions covered until these have been put on the computer.

Literary Sources. Most of the material has now been "slipped", and is being, and in many cases has been, distributed regionally. Revision of this material, particularly lexicographical Sources, continues. Work on the selected Christian Sources chosen for inclusion is now complete except for that on the Acta Sanctorum, half of which is completed.

Epigraphical Sources. The slipping of mainland Greece and the Balkans has been largely completed. Dr. Osborne, after a final visit to Princeton, for which the Committee once again must express its gratitude to the Institute of Advanced Study for the

provision of valuable assistance, has now completed the compilation of Attic material, and it remains to sort this into its final form. There is a rough total of some 100,000 entries. Dr. Griffin has now completed the onomastikon of Delphi, and will be occupied next year with the revision and completion of the files of the Peloponnese and Boeotia (the first regions covered by the project). The slipping of Thessaly remains half-done. Except for Euboea, work on the islands has now been finished, with Dr. Jeffery's and Miss Pitt's completion of the Cretan onomastikon, and the very welcome incorporation from the Agora files of Miss Grace's material relating to Rhodian amphora-fabricants. Further north, beyond Macedonia (now being computerized), the material (Greek and Latin) up to and including Moesia Superior and coastal Dalmatia is the only material outstanding, and a new collaborator, Mr. Emilio Marin of the Archaeological Museum of Split, has undertaken the latter region (notably the Dalmatian Islands). Professor Bodor of Cluj has provided the material, largely Greek names in Latin, from Dacia. In the western Mediterranean Dr. Crawford has begun work on Magna Graecia and Sicily and Miss Reynolds on Cyrenaica and N. Africa.

In Asia Minor progress over the last year has been very satisfactory. Miss Pitts has completed the onomastikon of Miletos as well as of other cities of Ionia, and is now working on the Lydian

hinterland. The Committee wishes to thank Dr. D. Knibbe of the Austrian Archaeological Institute, who very generously provided the Lexicon with a complete index of the inscriptions of Ephesus (now appearing in Professor Merkelbach's Corpus of Inscriptions of the Cities of Asia Minor), which we were able to photo-copy. Miss Pitts has now entered these on cards and thus the most formidable single obstacle to the rapid progress of our work in the coastal area is surmounted. For Smyrna Dr. G. Petzl has generously undertaken to provide similar indexes as they become available, and once more we are saved a considerable expense of time, and at the same time profit from the work of the foremost authority on the material. In Caria Dr. E. Rice has finished her work on the coastal area, and is now dealing with the inland cities east of the Marsyas River (the area west of that having been done for us by Mr. Hornblower, as reported last year). Dr. S. Jameson has undertaken to complete her work on Lycia and Pamphylia, and Dr. Mitchell his on Mysia. For the rest of Asia Minor we hope to receive assistance from the members of the RECAM team of the British Institute of Ankara, in the first place for Pontus and Paphlagonia.

Dear Virginia,

As I said in Athens, I have had a "print-out" of the Rhodian fabrics only, made, for you to look at. It is rather a forbidding document as it stands, but I thought it best for you to see it at its first, but once corrected, stage, before we proceed any further, & hope it is absorbed in the general Rhodian file which it would be very cumbersome to handle — and to post — as it is, I am indebted to Hector for acting as postman.

1. The Roman script. This is fairly easy: Q = D, C = X, Y = Φ, X = Ξ; the others are, I think, self-evident.
2. Accents, breathings etc. An * before a name indicates a rough breathing, + there is no sign before a smooth breathing. Acute accents are represented by the figure 1 following the accented vowel A GA1 QARCOS, circumflex by 3, A GA QOKLH 3 S; there are, naturally, no barytone accents. The symbol ↑ at the beginning of a line indicates a continuation from the previous line.
3. The ampersand, &, simply indicates an 'information-check' in each entry between the constituent parts, viz.: Name - place - date - reference.
4. What I hope you will do if you have time is simply to decide whether you want to alter any individual item, by deletion or addition for reference, or by correction. Each item is unnumbered in the sequences 19 and 20, so for reference it is sufficient simply at this stage to refer to eg. 19/26 and that is Ἀνδροδόκος, while 20/26 is Καλλιμάχης. I have a duplicate copy.
5. The principle I have attempted to follow is, I think, what we agreed upon, viz: where there is no satisfactory publication, or discussion by you, we have simply put your file no: R42 = Agora file, Rhodes, fabricant 42 (the explanation will be given in the prolegomena); where you have discussed a fabricant we have added that. There is a residue references to Nilsson in cases where you thought the same fabricant might be involved, but of course we would gladly delete any of these you consider erroneous or misleading.
6. The quality of literal accuracy should be high. The list was punched, from cards made out by me in Athens, by a Danish epigraphist who is a demon for accuracy.

I have not sent you the eponyms because you provided full references for these, and they have consequently been embodied in the main Rhodian file, & it would mean I would have to send you 18 sequences. I could do this, but I think it would be better, if you wished to see it, to let it pass through the next Computer-phase, which is easier to read, but has no serial numbers.

One other point. You may be confused at first by the difference between 'BC' and 'B' - the explanation is that the first is used for specific dates, e.g. 175-150 BC, the latter for century or part-century dates, e.g. 19/27, "Avtros 2/1B = "late 2nd-early 1st cent BC".

The queries ^{immediately} after 'Rhodes' (e.g. 19/39 "Avtros, 19/51 Arri'bas) indicate that the name is either notably, though perhaps not exclusively, Serric or foreign, & that we do not claim a positive Rhodian origin for the individual. It is possible that one or two have been actually omitted from this list for the same reason, where the doubt seems to us very strong. In that case the person in question appears with exactly the same reference to R- in the file of those of 'unknown origin'.

I should finally add that there is no difficulty about adding names at this stage, if necessary.

I'm sorry there is no much detail here, but I am naturally very anxious you should not have to scratch your head unnecessarily. Similarly if you wish to keep the list for any purpose please do so, since I have, as I said, a duplicate from which to work.



A. ANNUAL REPORT

1978/91. General Report

The date of completion depends upon the delivery of completed material by a number of unpaid collaborators overseas and at home. Their productivity depends on the amount of time they are able to give to the work, and though they are aware that we would like to see the first phase of the operation - the collection of data - completed by 1981, it is impossible to tie our collaborators down to a rigid timetable, and since one or two of the are only now beginning their work (see below under Progress Report), and some have yet to begin, we must obviously allow for a delay. The Computer programming will, as previously forecast, continue for a considerable time after the completion of stage I, and this too depends on factors which are hardly controllable - the smooth functioning of the computer itself, the amount of correction necessary on print-outs etc. In addition a great deal of editorial work is necessary both before and after computerization.

However, progress in both phases of the work continues uninterrupted, and the prospect of a completion-date roughly within the envisaged period remains.

In the course of the present year, partly as a result of the construction of a 'Porson' Greek font for the computer

the Oxford University Press has offered to publish the Lexicon in normal format (as opposed to microfiche) from 'photo-ready' copy; i.e. from a completely corrected print-out. This offer was accepted by the Committee, and given the blessing of the Council of the Academy. Both for practical reasons (the bulk of the material, when published in normal format), and because of the later date of commencement of the accumulation of data in some peripheral areas.

The Committee has decided that the publication should be in two parts, Vol. I covering the Greek Mainland, the Balkans, Italy and Sicily, Cyrenaica, the Aegean Islands and the Coastal regions of Asia Minor, Vol. II, Syria, Palestine, Egypt, the regions of the Anatolian Plateau and the trans-Euphratic territories. A terminal data for the inclusion of newly published material for Vol. I has been set at the end of 1980 (i.e. no material published after that

date will be included in Vol. I), and it is hoped that the collection of data will be complete by the end of 1982. It is estimated that a further two years will be required for purely editorial work, and the committee, on this basis, hopes that it will be possible, if the computer-printing does not create unforeseen difficulties, to submit the photo-ready copy to the Press at the end of 1984. Decisions regarding the final break-down of the material for publication will naturally be taken with the University Press.

2. Progress Report

1. (i). Literary sources (pagan). The bulk of this material has now been slipped, and Mrs. S. West of Hertford College has undertaken the completion of this task. Mr. K. Jenner spent the year revising the slips prepared by Mrs. Burton in the first two years of the project and will continue this work at least for another year.

(ii). Literary sources (Christian). Dr. Norris of the Emmanuel School of Religion, Johnson City, Tennessee, and the University of Tubingen, has completed his slipping the Church Historians, and his slips have now been received. The Committee is most grateful to Dr. Norris for his voluntary work in this field. Dr. Crabbe has continued her work on the Acta Sanctorum which she has now completed to the end of April, and has also worked through the proof material of Vol. II of the PLRE, extracting the necessary references. Her work on the Acta will continue to occupy her through the coming year. Apart from this, the only outstanding major Christian text to be slipped is the correspondence of St. Nilus (over 1000 letters).

(iii). Latin authors. The following authors have now been slipped, mainly by Mr. N. Kay: Aulus Gellius, Quintilian, Ammianus Marcellinus, SHA, Vitruvius, Lucilius, Apuleius, Livy, Suetonius, Cicero, Pliny, NH, Caesar, Varro, Cato, Columella, Petronius, Juvenal and Persius, Martial, Tacitus, Statius, Horace, Pliny iun. St Jerome (letters), Symmachus, Ausonius, it is felt that this represents a sufficient selection of Latin authors.

2. Inscriptions. Slipping of the Mainland and Aegean areas is now largely complete. Dr. Osborne, with the aid of Professor J. Traill, has completed the Attic material down to the Imperial period, the islands of Rhodes and Chios are also finished, and it is hoped that the material from Crete, which Dr. L.H. Jeffery is preparing, will be available shortly. Mrs. A. Griffin, who has been at work on Delphi since joining the project in December 1978, has now completed approximately two-thirds of the total amount, and she estimates that the total Delphi onomastikon should be completed within six months. The slipping of material from Thessaly and Euboea remains to be completed. Material for Cyrenaica (Miss Reynolds) and Magna Graecia and Sicily (Dr. M. Crawford) will, it is hoped, be available next year. The slips for Rumania excluding Dacia, have been received from Mrs. Dorutziu-Boila of Bucharest, and Professor A. Bodor of Cluj has kindly volunteered to provide the material from Dacia. The Yugoslav material, prepared, for the lexicon by Miss Jagust of Belgrade, was revised and completed with great generosity by Professor F. Papazontou.

The Committee wishes to record its continued gratitude to the Institute of Advanced Study, Princeton, and particularly to Professor C. Habicht, for the aid it has rendered the Attic part of the project by enabling Dr. Osborne and Professor J. Traill to work together on much of the material at Princeton.

Asia Minor. Considerable progress has been made in this region, which, with the mainland largely completed, forms the focal point of our activity. In addition to the Mysian material slipped at an earlier stage by Dr. Mitchell (especially the Cyzicus region, Ilium, Alexandria Troas, Pergamon), the cities for which volumes have been published in Professor Merkelbach's new Corpus of the Greek cities of Asia Minor (Lampsakos, Assos, Erythrai, Notion), have all been slipped by Miss L. Pitts who has also completed the inscriptions of Teos. In Caria Miss E. Rice has completed most of her work on the coastal cities, while Mr. S. Hornblower has generously slipped the inscriptions of most of the inland region west of the Marsyas river (Lagina, Mylasa, Panamara, Stratonicea); this operation, demanding expert knowledge of a very complex body of material, has disposed of a very considerable problem. Further east in Caria the Committee has been promised the material from Aphrodisias from Mrs. Roueché (working for Miss Reynolds), while Miss Rice will cover the rest of Caria east of the Marsyas river (Tabai etc). The material from Mysia, Lycia, and Pamphylia is largely covered or in hand (Dr. Mitchell, Dr. S. Jameson Dr. T. Bryce), and the Committee has recently received from Commander T. Mitford the onomastikon of Rough Cilicia completed by his father, for which it wishes to record its thanks. The outstanding areas to be attacked are Ionia, Lydia, (for which Professor Foss hopes to be able to provide the material from Sardis, while a volume of TAM covering N.W. Lydia, prepared by Professor P. Herrmann, due for publication in the near future, should considerably lighten our task), and Bithynia (of which the volume of TAM covering Nicomedia and neighbourhood, was published by Professor F.K. Dorner in 1978) on the West, and Pontus and Paphlagonia on the North. In these latter regions the committee hopes to be able to make use of material now being collected by the Academy-sponsored Regional Epigraphical Corpus of Asia Minor (RECAM) undertaken by the British Institute of Ankara. Three tasks of major importance remain: the slipping of material from Smyrna, Ephesos and Miletos. The first of these, we understand, is to appear shortly in the corpus of the Greek cities of Asia Minor, and we have commenced work on the onomastikon of Miletos.

Syria, Palestine, Egypt, etc. As explained above the material from this region will form the main part of Vol. 11. The collection of material is proceeding, and is in the hands of Professor J. Bingen (Egypt), Monsieur M. Sartre (Syria) and Dr. B. Isaac (Palestine). Material from these areas relevant to Vol.1 (i.e. natives of regions covered in Vol.1) has been extracted and added to the files of Vol.1.

3. Papyri. Work on documentary papyri, which forms part of Vol.11 has been largely suspended, since Mr. D. Jones, the main assistant, was granted a year's suspension by the Committee to enable him to complete work on his Oxford D Phil. It is hoped that he will recommence work in October 1980. Dr. J. Rea has meanwhile continued to slip material. The anonymous literary papyri have now been slipped by Mrs. S. West.

4. Coins. The Committee commissioned Mr. C.J. Howgego to continue, and if possible to complete, the file of names on coins, on which a considerable amount of work had already been done by Dr. D. Nash and Miss. King. Much of the available material, C. Peloponnesus and other parts of the mainland (Dr. Nash), Rhodes and the Dodecanese (Mr. R. Ashton), Erythrae, Clazomenae etc. (Dr. P. Kinns) has already been incorporated into the main regional files. Mr. Howgego has so far completed the Imperial material from Ionia, and is now commencing work on the Imperial issues of Caria, while Dr. Nordbo of the University of Oslo has made available to us his corpus of the numismatic material of Cnidos.
5. Archaeological material. Work in this sector, in the hands of Dr. A. Johnston is now almost complete. Since the last report, Dr. Brashinsky of Leningrad and Dr. Vinogradov of Moscow have provided further material from S. Russia and the Black Sea, and their contributions have enabled the Lexicon to include much new material.
6. Bibliographical material. The compilation of these entries has now begun. As originally envisaged, it is intended to restrict these entries strictly to discussions of the meaning, typology, and distribution of names, and to exclude references both to undifferentiated lists of such names and to prosopographical discussions.
7. Computer Programme.

Our Lexicon Committee met yesterday to approve the draft Annual Report and Budget for 1979/80, and it was pointed out again that the sum of £250 earmarked for your contribution to the Lexicon was still unpaid, and I was asked to sort the matter out with you without further delay. So I am writing to ask you whether you will accept this figure, if a draft is sent to you now. I realise from what you said previously that you considered this sum insufficient, but I think it is only fair to the Committee to tell you that this sum was, and is, very much larger than our normal payments to external collaborators, and that we made this offer of a larger fee because you had explained that you would need to employ an assistant for the purpose. We are of course fully aware that £250 now is in this country not what it was five years ago, but with the recent strengthening of the pound against the drachma the difference in Greece is less than it was a year or two ago. Dear Peter:

I have here two letters from you, one of June 7, received after I came back from two weeks in Rhodes, collecting a lot of data, the other without date, but cancelled on the envelope as of 25.X.79. I am now just getting ready to go to the US day after tomorrow. I did not want to leave you without reply, but have no time to write at length.

No, I do not accept your proposed draft.

As to your handling of the names of fabricants of amphoras in the lexicon, we would be able with relatively little trouble to send you such publication references as there are for the stamps of Kos, since the catalogue for publication of our Koan volume is ready enough to yield this information in an orderly way. Early in 1978 I asked you why you had had Miss Sherwin White include ^{in her *anomastikon*} exactly one of the 60-odd names we had sent her, and you replied in a way that seemed to me off the point (enclosed photocopy). If you now would like to have this information for Kos, let me know, and let me know whether these names will be listed under Kos.

For Rhodes, I am sorry to say we do not have time now to do the work out of order from the point of view of my own research, as we did for the eponyms. Those, you have, and those after all are what you really want. I suggest you use the list of fabricants of 1965, with which nothing published is comparable. Omit from this all entries on which there is an asterisk. You don't have to look at the eponym list and make subtractions. All these names with asterisks are known eponyms of the period suggested, but out of excess of caution I listed as possible fabricants those persons who appeared in unrestored stamps without the preposition. I now know that eponyms are many times named without the preposition. Omit then all entries with the asterisk, but not all names that are sometimes listed with an asterisk: cf. for instance no.239, EYΘPANΩP - the one with the head of Helios is certainly a fabricant.

I certainly suggest that you include no names as Rhodian fabricants that do not appear in our typed list. I do undertake to look up any of those, if you send them to me with a reference as to where you found them. Stamp names cannot be taken indiscrimately from old publications, even from Nilsson; your list would be full of scholars' uninformed restorations, such as IIIIONIKOZ in your Rhodian book. For that name actually Nilsson indicated a doubt, blaming it on a publication, as a single example.

Remove from our typed list the queried name BOYOHPOZ, no.133; too bad, but it seems to be rather BOHOZ, cf. no.129. (You remember, it was a resolution of a monogram.)

Dear Virginia,

I wonder if I may call on you once again. Since we last communicated, I have completed the Rhodian onomastikon (some 16,000 names, I reckon), except for the fabricants of the amphora-handles, who may or may not be Rhodian (though I would guess that a fairly high proportion of them are) but have to be included in this operation. I have done what I could myself in this connection, using Nilsson as a base and all your lists and publications in sequence. I now find that checking my list (some 260 names strong) against the typescript list you sent me a good many years ago, & subtracting from that list all the eponyms in the current list which we have used for the Lexicon, there are outstanding some 140 names, presumably those of fabricants. They have presumably occurred in innumerable excavation reports, some published, some unpublished maybe, and I wonder whether it would be possible for you to document this residual list to the extent that that is necessary. I am not willing to

? send you this without giving you a fair chance to say 'No, can't be done', but if you think it can I could send you the list very quickly. (I have, incidentally, subtracted from it the names from Delos listed in BCH 76, 1952, & included them in my file with that reference, except where they recur fully published in EAD 27)

The Lexicon rolls along fairly happily. Now Kat Rhodes is largely completed - tho' I still have the Persea to do - I am finding editing of other people's material takes up much of my time. The Press here will print the Lexicon from 'camera-ready' copy, and I aim at letting them have the material ready in 1984; but the computer moves at the pace of a dinosaur, so that may be optimistic.

I hope to be in Athens after Christmas at the School for a month or two - without my Lexicon files I fondly hope.
